STRONG RALLY UPS GRAINS AT CLOSE

CHICAGO, June 4 (AP)—A strong rally which added as much as 2 cents a bushel in some cases to grain futures prices occurred just before the close today.

Buying that came from dealers who had sold short previously, with some orders also attributed to processors and consuming interests, stimulated the advance.

Bullish trade factors included Secretary of Commerce Jones statement that duty free entry of war materials would not affect domestic prices for those commodities and a bureau of agricultural economics report that the federal loan program would support wheat prices despite the record supply in sight. Loan prices are 10 to 20 cents above wheat values, traders estimated.

Wheat closed 18-18 cents higher than yesterday, July \$1.18-1.19, September \$1.20-1.21; corn also 18-18c up, July 85-86c, September 89-90c; oats 1-1c higher; soybeans 1-1c up; rye 1-1c higher.

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STOCK MARKET FAILS TO FEEL DUTCH HARBOR

NEW YORK, June 4 (AP)—The stock market today took the Japanese bombing of Dutch Harbor in stride and leading industrials were bid up fractions to around 2 points.

While yesterday's last-minute runup brought in occasional profit selling, rising inclinations at the start restricted offerings. Motors and specialties accounted for the principal strength and a number of favorites touched buy levels for the year. Steels, rails, coppers, oils and aircrafts were relatively narrow. Gains were reduced in most categories before the close.

Transfers, approximating 500,000 shares, were the largest since May 21.

The feeling in Wall Street was that European war developments, including persistent aerial blasts at Germany, far overshadowed the latest Alaskan thrust.

Du Pont pushed up in the face of the indictment of this company, together with several other explosives manufacturers, on charges of violating anti-trust laws.

Stocks in the new high class included General Motors, Chrysler, Goodyear, U. S. Rubber, Montgomery Ward, American Can, Pepsi-Cola and Pan American Airways.

Ahead the greater part of the day were American Telephone, Westinghouse, American Tobacco "B," Sears Roebuck, Dow Chemical, Union Carbide, Philip Morris, Woolworth, J. C. Penney, Public Service of N. J. and Consolidated Edison.

United Aircraft slipped to a new bottom for 1942 before getting support. Lower at intervals were N. Y. Central, Great Northern, Anaconda, Goodrich, Douglas Aircraft and Standard Oil (N. Y.).

An extension of the rally in commodities was helpful. Bonds improved.

Two hundred forty-five dollars was slashed from the July budget of the Klamath County Public Welfare commission in the group's regular monthly meeting Monday night, Mrs. Altha Urquhart, county director, said today.

Mrs. Urquhart said the total July allotment will be \$11,300, split into \$3500 for general assistance, \$6100 for old age assistance, \$1650 for aid to dependent children and \$50 for aid to the blind.
