Four former Klamath Falls diamond performers, determined to defeat the Pelicans in the weekend series scheduled for Recreation park Saturday and Sunday, will lead the Dorris Lumberjacks into the important contests that will decide leadership of the Oregon-California baseball loop, provided one or the other of the clubs sweeps the twin bill.

Clyde Carlstrom, erstwhile Klamath hurler who has done hitting was a factor in the Klamath even split in the Crater series and his defensive ability also was excellent. He probably will be at shortstop in the games this week, teaming with Manager Ernie Bishop to form a strong second base combination.

Other Pelican positions likely will be filled by Paul Crapo at first base, Hi Hatfield on third, Paul Bernadou, Mario Pisan and Leo Soran in the outfield and Dave Dixon behind the plate. Virg Haynes is slated to be the Saturday evening pitcher with Frank Van Driesche the possible Sunday mound choice for the locals.

Fresh from their double win, 10-0 and 7-0, over the Grants Pass Merchants last week in a makeup of opening round tilts, the 'Jacks are confident of breaking even in the Klamath series, believing with a little luck that they will sweep the two engagements and remain atop the loop standings well out in front of the other three teams.

FISH LAKE is really off again, on again, and gone again. The fishing has really improved in the last few days and the weather certainly has.

EAST LAKE has been the closest to a sure fire thing in the last week. Some nice fish are being caught on flies. Bait, using worms, is best for most times.

PAULINA LAKE reports show fish being caught on just about the works — trolling, flashers, wobblers, flatfish, late fly fishing, and just plain old fashioned bait fishing.

DIAMOND LAKE shows no signs of life, with few fish being caught. Not worth the trip for the time being. A few who used flies had some luck, but mostly spawners.

LITTLE DESCHUTES in some spots is really hot on flies. Mostly grey or spotted wing.

THE NORTH FORK of the SPRAGUE RIVER is yielding some fish on bait. Water is still high but clearing.

THE ROGUE RIVER is spotty but some nice fishing late in the day has been found. In the Union creek area it should be getting good if this weather holds. Some salmon are being taken around Grants Pass, mostly on spinners. Salmon still are coming in at Gold Beach with some nice fish being taken.

This week should bring some activity on the small streams and lakes in this area. On Tuesday we will let you in on this otherwise dark secret. "TAKE A BOY FISHING."

Fishin's Fun

The merry-go-round is all wound up for another ride and a lot of us will be on board to try for the brass ring in the form of a little good fishing.

According to the calendar, barometer, thermometer and the crystal ball, the fishing should be a little better this weekend. With the way the weather has been you must remember this, and it works along with the present high water and condition of the water, that bait fished in the deeper spots is more liable to catch the fish.

This is true with flashers—let out more line than you usually do and troll slower using as large a flasher as possible with your bait about two feet behind the flasher. Don't be afraid to put on plenty of worms. Where worms and eggs usually work use a spinner backed with worms or eggs. After all, any

Mel Ott is likely to be remembered in baseball as the quietest record-breaker on record.

Nobody gives it much thought any more, but every time the 33-year-old outfielder-manager of the New York Giants hits a home run or draws a base on balls he breaks the all-time National league record—which he himself holds, of course.

Yesterday he broke another record—the runs batted in mark of 1582 that Rogers Hornsby took 23 years to set while mov-
