# STATE MILITIA PLANNED FOR TULELAKE AREA

TULELAKE, June 4—Organization of a state militia unit in the Tulelake area will be effected in the near future, it was revealed following a meeting of the Siskiyou and Modoc county farm bureaus, called for a joint session by M. V. Maxwell, Siskiyou county farm advisor, and John Hayes, Alturas, Modoc county farm advisor. The meeting held in the gymnasium of the Tulelake high school was well attended.

With Siskiyou county's goal set at 1000 members, Tulelake hopes to contribute generously to the total. Modoc farmers were also heartily in accord with the plan and registrations were numerous at the close of the meeting.

Membership is entirely voluntary, there is no compensation and members will be released from duty upon presentation of a reasonable excuse. The organization offers an opportunity for men between the ages of 16 and 65 who are not acceptable for duty in the nation's armed forces to be of service to the county in case of emergency.

Each registrant to be eligible must be in sound health, own and shoot a gun and be willing to purchase the few clothes to be used as a uniform. These will include khaki colored shirt and trousers, brown shoes, regulation belt and some type of overseas hat.

Training of the unit will be regulated by local needs and units may be transferred to other areas only in case of an enemy attack. The militia is non-political, it was emphasized, and has no connection with the state guard. Officers will be selected from among members of the unit.

M. V. Maxwell stated that while he had not visited any of the more densely populated areas or cities in the county, all sections that he had contacted were agreed that units should be organized at once. Registration cards for both Modoc and Siskiyou counties may be obtained at the office of W. H. Anderson, Siskiyou county horticultural commissioner in Tulelake.

Maxwell during the meeting gave a history of the state militia as it functions in England, and pictures on the same subject were shown by Hays.

Labor problems confronting local farmers were brought up for discussion. Farmers are still in the dark as to the possibility of using Japanese help from the reception center in the potato harvest. Contradictory reports have been circulated, it was pointed out.
