'WAR BABIES' LEAD STOCKS ON UPSWING

NEW YORK, June 5 (AP)—Led by a number of so-called war babies that recently have been on the sick list, the stock market today negotiated another selective upswing, the third in a row. Transfers approximated 500,000 shares.

Steels, aircraft, chemicals and assorted specialties came to the fore around mid-day for gains of fractions to 6 points or so. Rails, coppers and utilities participated to a certain extent. Motors, mail orders and scattered climbers of the past few days displayed irregular tendencies.

Prominent on the upside most of the day—some slipped at the finish—were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Youngstown Sheet, Douglas Aircraft, United Aircraft, Sperry, Allied Chemical, Dow Chemical, American Can, American Telephone, Western Union, Consolidated Edison, Philip Morris, Johns-Manville, Anaconda, Kennecott and American Smelting.

Off at intervals were General Motors, Chrysler, Montgomery Ward, Sears Roebuck, Oliver Farm, Caterpillar Tractor, Texas Co., General Electric and U. S. Gypsum.

Bonds were mostly higher. Commodities wavered.

RECOVERY STOPS ON GRAIN MARKET

CHICAGO, June 5 (AP)—Wheat prices were down a full cent a bushel at one time today and corn sagged almost that much as the grain market's recovery of the past two sessions was halted.

A let-up in demand from the mill and flour trade was blamed partly for the reaction in wheat. Uneasiness because of war reports from the Pacific also was a factor and the market largely ignored Kansas messages telling of crop deterioration in some parts of that state the past week or so. One report suggested bumper crop prospects in some localities have been reduced.

Short covering and recognition of the Kansas crop reports produced a late rally and wheat closed unchanged to 1c lower compared with yesterday, July 1.18-1.19, September 1.20-1.21. Corn was unchanged to 1c up, July 86-1/2c, September 89-1/2c; oats unchanged to 1c higher; soybeans 1-1/2c lower; rye 1-1/2c lower.

BOSTON WOOL

BOSTON, June 5 (AP-USA)—Clips of 12-month 64's fine wools, 2 1/4-inch staple and longer, today were selling to the mills occasionally at about \$1.18, clean basis, for average to good lots. Texas eight-months wools, average to good woolen type, were quoted at \$1.08 clean basis, and choice lots 2 cents higher. Fine territory 64's and fine good average French combing are quoted and selling at about \$1.18, clean basis, for killing in government contracts for worsted fabrics.

TOPPENISH, Wash. (AP)—Persons addicted to daytime card playing in Toppenish are dealing now from the top of the (hay) stack. Card room operators reported they were closing their places during the day so long as the farm labor shortage remained acute.

ROAD PROJECTS LET BY HIGHWAY BOARD

PORTLAND, June 5 (AP)—War-important highway improvement contracts totaling \$1,300,000 were let by the state highway commission yesterday, but a major project in the Camp Adair area was rejected on a bid of \$522,918.

The rejected bid, submitted by McNitt Bros., Eugene, was for grading 2.52 miles and paving 9.08 miles between Monmouth and the Benton county line. The commission received bids on an assortment of obsolete equipment located at Klamath Falls and Coquille highway equipment plants. The Coos Bay Salvage and Steel company bid \$210.31 for scrap steel, cast iron, brass, radiator cores and other equipment at Coquille; Rex Jarrett of Klamath Falls bid \$272.65 for similar equipment at Klamath Falls. There were no bidders on other equipment at Salem and La Grande plants.

The commission withdrew a \$1500 grant to radio station KOAC at Oregon State college to have been used to promote tourist travel, holding that possible gas rationing and the tire situation made such an expenditure unwise.

E. L. Gray of Independence asked the commission to set out the location of a bridge over the Willamette river to join the towns of Monmouth and Independence which, he said, were growing together and needed a trans-river link. The matter was referred to the highway engineers.

The commission awarded contracts on numerous roads, among which were:
Lane—Goshen-Pleasant Hill section Willamette highway, federal air project, 3.98 miles grading, surfacing, bituminous macadam, C. J. Eldon, Portland, \$272,845.

Construction of bridge over coast fork Willamette river and three pile trestle bridges on Goshen-Pleasant Hill section Willamette highway, Tom Lillebo, Reedsport, \$53,774.

FUNDS OKED FOR KLAMATH HIGHWAY

SACRAMENTO, June 5 (AP)—Siskiyou county's long fight to obtain help in the improvement of the scenic Klamath river highway reached a successful conclusion today when state officials added their approval to that of federal authorities.

State Director of Public Works Frank W. Clark approved allocation of \$68,000 of state road funds to the project, to which \$150,000 has already been allocated from federal funds.

Work contemplated includes the widening and realigning of the highway to remove dangerous curves between Thompson creek and the Klamath river at Walker, and the construction of three bridges at Irving, Stanshaw and Sandy Bar creeks, where present structures are posted for limited loads and are reportedly beyond repair.

Clark also approved allocation of \$33,000 in state funds for the channelization of US 99E into a four-lane highway south of Marysville at the intersection of the proposed Camp Beale road.

California Feels Slight Earthquake

SAN FRANCISCO, June 5 (AP)—Weak earth tremors were felt here at about 5:35 a. m. today and other California points experienced earthquake shocks at about the same time. No damage was reported.

Watsonville reported a sharp shock and light sleepers were awakened at about the same time in Salinas by a window rattling quake which likewise did no damage.

SCHROER RELEASED

SALEM, June 3 (AP)—Del Schroer, shortstop for the Salem Western International league baseball club, was given his outright release last night.

First Baseman Clint Cameron, Outfielder Joe Gonzales, and Pitcher Con Rasmussen were placed on the suspended list.

Ship Building Labor Votes Cut In Overtime Pay

Labor, shipbuilders and government representatives joined hands this week in a major expression of wartime production unity, before the close of a three-day session of the Pacific Coast Ship Repair conference, at San Francisco, by a unanimous recommendation that all double time in the ship repair industry be abandoned for the duration, in favor of time and one-half. The conference also established uniform premiums for all shifts, and all crafts agreed to work shifts.

The conference, which was called under the auspices of the Shipbuilding Stabilization committee of the war production board, was participated in by representatives of unions affiliated with the Pacific coast district of the Metal Trade council representing the ship building and ship repair companies of the Pacific coast, the navy, the maritime commission and the war production board. The agreement reached by the conference is subject to ratification by the principals of those who attended the conference.

Gas-Rubber Investigation Asked by 100 Congressmen

WASHINGTON, June 5 (AP)—President Roosevelt and 11 government officials who are searching for a solution to the rubber and gasoline problems conferred at the White House today but apparently reached no definite conclusions.

One of the participants said flatly no decisions were made and he did not know when any might be expected.

In the meantime nearly 100 congressmen met and adopted a resolution proposing a congressional investigation of the gasoline-rubber situation, opposing nationwide rationing until "facts" are given congress to justify it, and attacking "bureaucratic methods" and dictatorial policies. Numerous representatives spoke in criticism of Leon Henderson, who directs the rationing program, and later some continued their attacks on the program in brief speeches in the house.

At a press conference earlier, Mr. Roosevelt had turned aside a question whether nationwide gasoline rationing would be ordered by July 15 by saying the gasoline situation would be considered at today's conference.

A cabinet meeting was scheduled for later in the afternoon and it was considered likely that the motor fuel and rubber situations and possible ways to meet them might be taken up there, also.

Price Administrator Leon Henderson merely mumbled past a thick cigar, making no effort to say anything, when reporters asked him about the White House conference.

When Secretary Ickes left the meeting, newspapermen inquired: "Is there anything you can say, Mr. Secretary?" "Hello," was his answer.
