

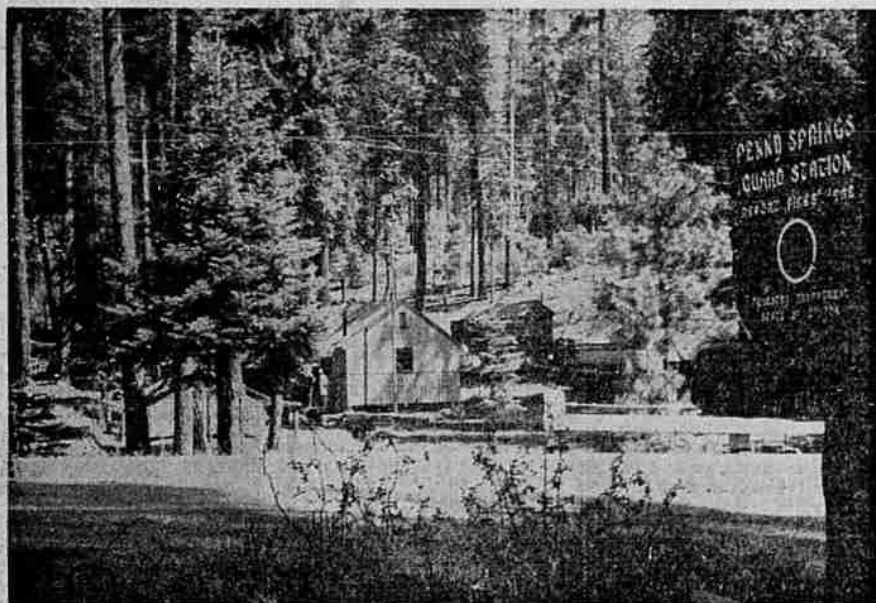
Picture News of the Week

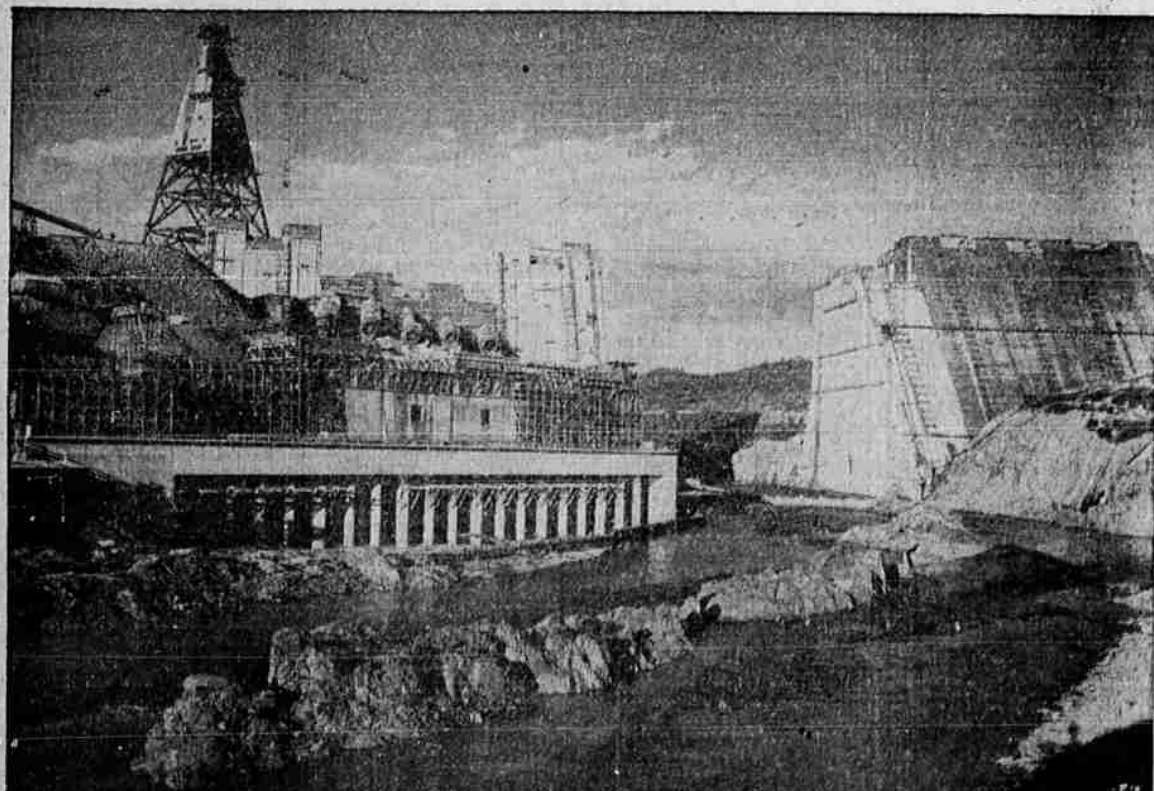
