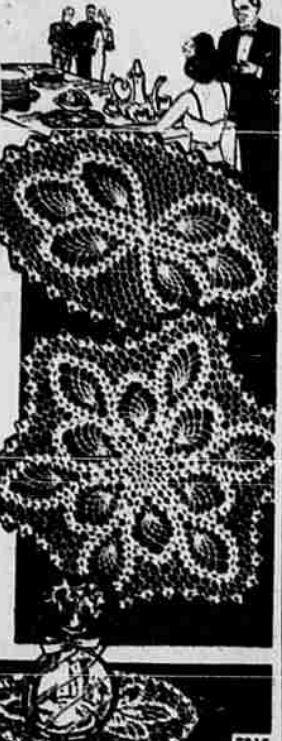
OBITUARIES

WASHINGTON, June 8 (AP)—President Roosevelt signed Saturday legislation making an additional \$210,000,000 available for the war shipping administration to insure vessels against destruction in bringing supplies to and from this nation, its troops and allies. A measure increasing the Reconstruction Finance corporation's loaning authority by \$5,000,000,000, or a total of \$14,130,000,000, was also signed into law by the chief executive.
