

WEYERHAEUSER CAMP MAY GET SCHOOL CHANGE

WEYERHAEUSER CAMP 4, June 9—A special school meeting was held at the Weyerhaeuser Camp 4 school house Monday night, at which Fred Peterson of the county unit presented the problem of teacher and bus service shortages and suggested a change be made in the local set-up.

He suggested the local school and teacher be sent to Camp 6, and all school children here be taken to Keno by bus.

Another suggestion was to keep the local school and add the upper grades to it, and board high school children in either Keno, Klamath Falls or Ashland. This arrangement would require any grade school children living at King Cole to walk along the highway or provide their own transportation.

It was also suggested that any high school students who provide their own transportation to the bus line at Ellingson's mill would be allowed something on that expense from county school funds, the same as high school students boarding near a school.

The local school committee has announced another meeting in the school house on Thursday at 7 p. m. and urges all parents and other interested persons to attend.

Barrimore's Will Discloses Fears

LOS ANGELES, June 10 (AP)—John Barrimore's will, filed for probate today, disclosed that the actor's many-faceted personality included the fear of being buried alive.

The will, which specifically excluded all his four divorced wives from participating in his estate, requested his executors to employ doctors and cooperate fully with "any person who wishes to ascertain that I am in fact dead, and not in any other state having the semblance of death, in order, so far as possible, to avoid all risk of my being buried alive."

The actor, who made upward of a million during his long career, left an estate valued, in the legal phraseology, in excess of \$10,000, to it which his attorney, Gordon Levey, said would have no certain income.

With the exception of a few specific bequests, Barrimore left his estate to his three children, Diana, 21; Dolores, 12, and John Blythe Barrimore, 10.

Snell Cancels Driver Schools

SALEM, June 10 (AP)—Secretary of State Earl Snell announced today that Oregon driver training schools would be discontinued for the duration of the war, because of the need for motor vehicle conservation and because of possible gasoline rationing.

The courses have been conducted by the state department to promote traffic safety. Classes now under way will be completed, but no more will be scheduled.

Air Raid Wardens Must Stay on Duty

SALEM, June 10 (AP)—County defense councils must keep their auxiliary police and air raid wardens on duty after air raids to prevent panic-stricken mass evacuations which might impede the efficient operation of military forces and civilian protection agencies, the state civilian defense council ordered Monday.

"Should bombs drop on Oregon cities, it is of vital importance that no hysterical attempts

at evacuation be permitted," the council's orders said.

Aircraft observers in the civilian defense organization will receive enough gasoline so that they will be able to drive to and from their posts, the council said.
