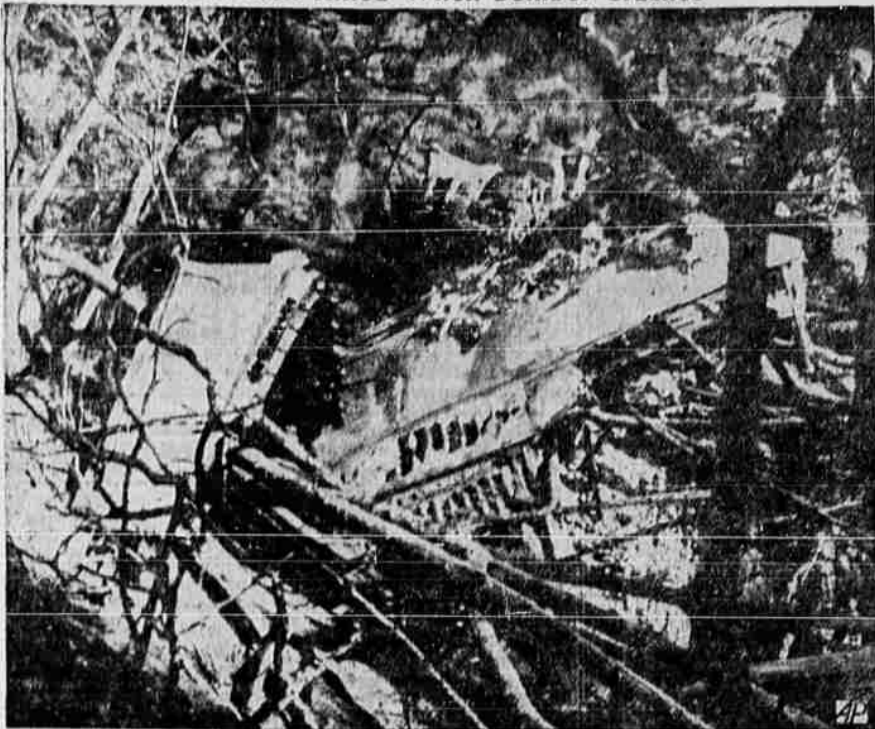

PARK BOARD INVESTIGATES CANAL HAZARD

Steps were taken by members of the city park board, in session Tuesday, to correct the hazard at the Alameda tennis court which borders the government canal when City Engineer E. A. Thomas was authorized to investigate the possibility of constructing a canopy over the court.

Action resulted from requests received by city officials following the drowning of Billy Gray, who fell into the canal recently in an effort to retrieve a tennis ball which had rolled into the canal water.

Members of the board pointed out that this was the first fatal accident connected with the Alameda court since its construction several years ago. The city engineer will also contact US reclamation officials in regard to fencing the canal.

E. E. Spencer, Moore park caretaker, was authorized to move the deer pen feed racks up the hill and away from the main roadway in the park. This will be done to improve the sightliness of the park. Work will probably be completed before the winter hay is laid in.

Park board members discussed ways and means of getting old pieces of logging equipment to the park for preservation. A number of "big wheels" and other pieces have been obtained but the problem of moving the equipment has not been solved.

BIG PRICE PAID FOR U. S. TIMBER

PORTLAND, Ore., June 10 (AP)—The Bellingham Plywood corporation yesterday paid the highest price ever recorded in a government timber sale, Regional Forester Lyle F. Watts, said. It was \$11.50 a thousand for 2,500,000 board feet of Douglas fir timber in the Skagit river area of the Mount Baker national forest.

In addition, 35 cents a thousand and less will be deposited for slash disposal.

SF Votes for More Air Raid Protection

SAN FRANCISCO, June 11 (AP)—With only one-third of the city's registered voters participating, a \$4,250,000 bond issue to provide additional air raid protection received overwhelming approval at the polls, the complete official count showed today.

The No. 2 issue which will finance purchase of additional fire fighting equipment badly needed in event of a siege of incendiary bombs carried 117,014 to 18,853.

NEW SP SCHEDULES GO INTO EFFECT

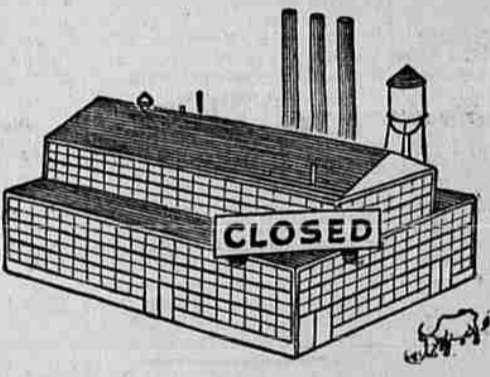
