Step by step the present stars of the major leagues are finding their way into the hallowed company of baseball's old-time all-time standouts.

The latest to earn a place on the permanent honor roll of the game is Roger (Doc) Cramer, the Detroit Tigers' outfielder, who made three hits against the New York Yankees yesterday to lift his lifetime total to 2001, a level that has been reached by only seven other players still active in the major leagues.

Dick Bartell of the New York Giants entered the 2000 hit class in April and Mel Ott, Paul and Lloyd Waner, Jimmie Foss, Joe Cronin and Charley Gehring already were there. Joe Medwick and Billy Herman of Brooklyn have a good chance of qualifying near the end of the Cramer season.

The three hits by Cramer were important individually, but they had nothing to do with the Tigers beating the world champions, 4-1.

Paul Waner notched his 2995th hit last night, but his Boston mates collected only three others off Rip Sewell, who pitched the Pittsburgh Pirates to a 3-0 shut-out over the Braves.

In another night contest, the New York Giants climbed into a third place tie in the National league with Cincinnati by beating the Reds, 6-1, their fifth straight victory over the Reds.

Big Bill Lee acquired his eighth victory of the season as the Chicago Cubs rallied for five runs in the seventh inning to beat the Phils, 5-2.

Weather kept the Brooklyn Dodgers idle at St. Louis again. The Boston Red Sox reinforced their hold on second place in the American league by trim-

ming the St. Louis Browns, 10-3. All the losers' runs off Tex Hughes came on a homer by Mike Chartak.

The Chicago White Sox made the Philadelphia Athletics exchange places in the cellar by beating the A's, 4-1.

The Cleveland Indians, held scoreless for eight innings by Buck Newsom, moved ahead with a three-run rally in the ninth, but had to go 12 innings to beat the Washington Senators, 4-3, in a night game.

still are far from fixed, but each of the principal cities of the north appears to be assured a look at one or the other of Uncle Sam's "dream" teams.

Organization of the gridiron program is in line with the military's present campaign to encourage every sort of competitive athletics and probably will serve to encourage schools and universities that might have worried about their football prospects for next fall. The army, like the navy, intends to set the example.

It is planned for the two army squads to begin training August 22, one somewhere in the mid-west and the other on the east coast. Six days later, on August 28, the west team has a date with the professional Washington Redskins in the Los Angeles coliseum.

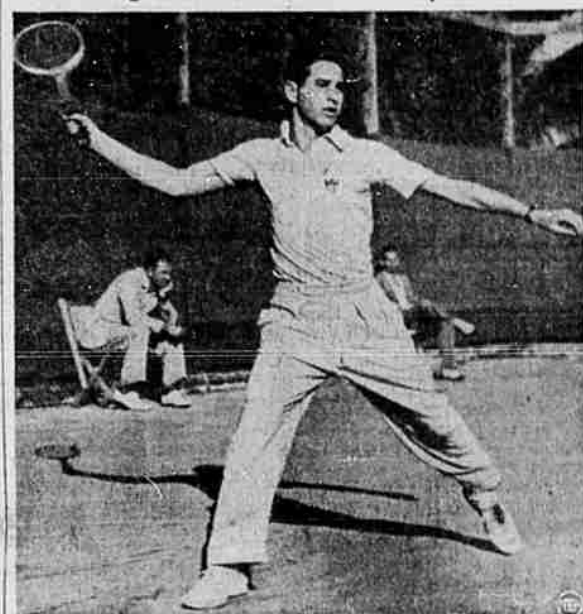

Hit Up and Into Forehand Drive; Start Backswing as Ball Leaves Enemy Bat

Use the Eastern grip for the forehand drive.

The forehand backswing is a rather flat ellipse. Start your backswing and get into position when the ball leaves your opponent's racket.

Body is sideways at about a 40-degree angle at the net. Stroke the ball at the right side of the body, approximately three feet away, allowing for the length of your arm and racket.

With your backswing, the weight is on the right foot and when the racket starts to the ball, the weight shifts to the left foot. This is known as "stepping into your shot."
