Roosevelt Urges Moral Fitness

WASHINGTON, June 17 (AP)—President Roosevelt called on the nation today to engage in a concerted drive for "total physical and moral fitness," with particular emphasis on elimination of "redlight" districts in war industry areas.

In a letter to Paul V. McNutt, director of the office of defense health and welfare, the president declared that such districts contributed a major part of the venereal disease infection found in army camps and naval stations.

Halfway around the world the lives of men in America's citizen army depend upon the efficiency of production at home.—Paul V. McNutt, chairman war manpower commission.
