

SP TO CONSTRUCT SIDING EXTENSION

A program of siding extension construction on the Southern Pacific's main line north of Klamath Falls was announced today by Clifford H. Reeves, SP general freight and passenger agent.

Reeves said sidings at Ouxie and Lobert are being extended and the Pine Ridge and Chilquin sidings extended and joined. The latter projects will in effect give the line a double track for a distance of three to four miles north of Chilquin. Reeves said the jobs were ordered to make the sidings capable of accommodating the SP's longest trains. Completion of the work will speed the road's freight and passenger services to and from Klamath Falls, he said.
