**BEARISH WAR NEWS CUTS OFF MARKET RISE**

NEW YORK, June 18 (AP)—Many stocks continued to attract modest buying in today's market but light profit taking inspired partly by the somewhat bearish war news from Libya and China, halted the general upswing which got underway late yesterday. Transfers approximated 350,000 shares.

Among stocks, American Can went into new high ground for 1942. Resistance was displayed by Sears Roebuck, Montgomery Ward, Standard Oil (N. J.), Anaconda, Douglas Aircraft, Consolidated Edison, Owens-Illinois and Union Carbide.

On the offside at intervals were Bethlehem, Chrysler, General Motors, Goodrich, Western Union, American Telephone, Eastman Kodak, General Electric, Santa Fe and Johns-Manville.

Bonds were as spotty as stocks.

BOSTON, June 18 (AP-USA)—There was a little improvement today in sales on the Boston wool market. Some good French-combing territory fine wools sold at \$1.18, clean basis, delivered. Medium wools continue very inactive with offerings from the semi-bright section of the country a little softer. Some buying was reported in Texas of best types of 12-month wools at ceiling prices.

**CHICAGO WHEAT**

CHICAGO, June 18 (AP)—Wheat prices fell more than a cent a bushel from the month's highs today as a result of profit taking and selling which traders said was inspired partly by Secretary of Agriculture Wickard's opposition to efforts in congress to keep government-owned surplus grain off the market at below parity prices.

Wickard's references to the necessity of heading off inflation also stilled trade rumors, largely responsible for some of the recent price upturn, that higher loan rates might be authorized for basic crops. Increased movement of new wheat and reports of high yields even though tests show too much moisture attracted attention. However, most of the wheat is being stored for loans.

Wheat closed 1-1/2c lower than yesterday, July \$1.20 1/4, September \$1.22-1.23; corn 1-1/2c off, July 86 1/2c, September 89 1/2c; oats 1-1/2c down; rye 1-1/2c lower; soybeans 1-1/2c lower.
