

WAR RESTRICTS ACTIVITIES OF VFW GATHERING

Arrangements for the twenty-second annual encampment of the Department of Oregon, Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States, to be held in Klamath Falls June 24 to 27, are complete, according to the local encampment commission.

Due to wartime restrictions and conditions prevailing at the present time, many of the features usually found in a VFW encampment will be missing this year. There will be no drum corps or drill teams, according to information received, all of those in the state being disbanded for the duration. Many of the members are serving in the armed forces and others in vital defense work and for this reason the attendance is expected to be considerably less than usual.

Features of the encampment open to the public will include the annual memorial to be held at Klamath Union high school auditorium at 8 p. m. on Wednesday, June 24. The public is invited to attend this memorial, which will pay tribute not only to the deceased veterans of past wars but also to those who have paid the supreme sacrifice during the present war. The feature of the memorial program will be an address by Past National Chaplain Perry Smith of Roseburg. The program will be under the direction of Department Commander Starr of Portland.

The public is also cordially invited to visit the Dugout, a feature of the convention which will headline Monte Brooks and a large group of entertainers from Portland. There will be a small admission charge to the Dugout and admission will be restricted to adults, due to lack of space. The encampment parade will be held Friday evening, June 26. Invitations have been issued to all local organizations to enter a unit in the parade and if any organizations have been overlooked in this respect, the committee requests that they get in touch with J. A. Souther or H. J. McGilvray and participate in the parade.
