

Reclamation Bureau Recalls 40th Anniversary of Start

WASHINGTON, June 17 (AP) — The bureau of reclamation celebrated its 40th anniversary today with a report to Secretary of the Interior Ickes by Reclamation Commissioner John C. Page that reclamation construction during the four decades were the mainstay of the economic strength of the western states.

Excessive rains last week were said to have caused some lodging of wheat and other small grain crops and to have spoiled large cuttings of alfalfa hay.

The bureau reported that in general, soil moisture was ample to super-abundant in nearly all sections from the great plains eastward, although a few localities, principally along the coast of the middle Atlantic area, continued dry.
