

LEADERS DRIFT TO MODERATELY LOWER LEVELS

NEW YORK, June 19 (AP)—It was a case of a few special situations on the bull side of today's stock market, most recognized leaders drifting to moderately lower levels.

The comforting angle of the market was that real selling pressure never appeared. Declines or fractions to a point or so ruled in the closing hour with dealings approximating 275,000 shares.

The ancient Wall Street dictum that "when Eric common pays a dividend there'll be icicles in hell" went out the window. Directors actually voted a 50-cent payment on the junior shares and certificates, first such disbursement for any Eric company in 76 years. The common, preferred and certificates pushed up fractions. Announcement of a dividend for Wabash preferred also lifted this stock.

In arrears the greater part of the time were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Chrysler, Dow Chemical, Allied Chemical, J. C. Penney, Anaconda, Santa Fe, Westinghouse, Sears Roebuck, U. S. Rubber, Western Union, Du Pont and Texas Co.

Bread Pudding Recipe Proves Tried, True

Interesting recipes from Klamath housewives have been sent to this office and are of special significance because they represent the "tried and true" efforts of good cooks.
Mrs. Jeanette Ott, 1527 Oregon avenue, submits this very good bread pudding recipe.

Bread Pudding
Butter five slices of white or nut bread or toast and cut into small pieces. Put in baking dish and sprinkle with sugar or honey. Then make a custard of two beaten eggs, two cups of milk, one teaspoon vanilla and a few grains of salt. Sweeten to taste.
Pour over buttered bread and bake in moderate oven until the custard is set. Raisins and nuts, or other fruits may be added if desired.

Mrs. Ott suggests the substitution of margarine for butter, and light corn syrup for sugar with a small amount of sugar added. If you use raisins, be sure to press them in the custard so that they will not burn. Bake until the top is a nice brown and the custard is set.
Whipped cream may be put on top with dashes of jelly.

U. S. VERSION OF COMMANDOS STARTS

FORT LEWIS, Wash., June 19 (AP)—An American version of the famed British commando is being trained by the United States army with a promise that the finished product will be one of the most heavily-armed soldiers in the world and even more versatile than the commandos.
The super troops are from the combat engineers and have been named the American Pioneers—a name particularly apt because they will be called upon to initiate campaigns or battles, establish bridge-heads, demolish enemy installations, prepare paths, roads and bridges for advancing infantrymen.
However, they would not comprise the rear guard units, blowing up bridges, building road blocks, setting booby traps and otherwise making the enemy's advance uncomfortable.
For fighting purposes they are equipped with machete knives.

Fertile Fields of Southern Oregon Yield Market Items

The fertile fields of southern Oregon are yielding market produce and any tightening of the fresh vegetable belt which might have been felt this spring with the removal of thousands of Japanese farmers from their land, has been lessened.

From Klamath's acreages, despite cold weather during the past few weeks of the growing season, come local head lettuce, plump red radishes and green onions.
Ashland spinach, fine looking stuff, is coming from the valley, and also from the other side of the mountain we are buying cabbage, carrots, lettuce and hot-house cucumbers. Lake Labish celery, known to all Oregonians and especially those residents of the Salem community, is selling in local stores. The celery is the Utah Green type and much sought after by housewives that

prefer the green over the old white kind.
Still moving from the south are tomatoes, celery, cucumbers, squash and onions. Cherries are coming in from the south but those in the know say picking will start in around Salem next week. One or two cherry growers in the Medford and Eagle Point section have been asking for pickers, but like the strawberry crop, probably tons will go to waste for lack of workers.
Strawberries continue to sell at shortcake prices only. It is doubtful if many will be canned this year, sugar or no sugar. None is coming to Klamath Falls from Medford or Ashland, as the berries are probably used locally by the rapidly growing valley population. Strawberries sold in Klamath stores are being brought in from Portland.

WASHINGTON, June 19 (AP)—The war department announced Thursday it would reduce the number of officers assigned to duty in Washington, replacing many of them with members of the new army specialist corps, but made it plain that the new organization was not to have a job hunters or draft dodgers.
In a directive to Dwight F. Davis, director general of the specialist corps, Secretary Stimson outlined the policy for its selection of professional or technical personnel for administrative duties, primarily to release army officers for service with troops.

ICKES ENDORSES POWER MEASURES

WASHINGTON, June 19 (AP)—Secretary Ickes declared today the Grand Coulee and Bonneville dam would become a "monument to governmental stupidity" unless power generated by the huge hydroelectric project was distributed through public agencies.
He endorsed legislation (SA 2430 and HR 6890) to set up a Columbia power authority to acquire all private power properties in Oregon and Washington and resell them to public power bodies to handle Bonneville and Coulee energy.
Asked by Chairman Overton (D-La.) to comment on charges that public acquisition of the private utilities would be a step toward socialism, Ickes replied that holding companies had "pointed the way" to socialism in the power industry.
"Only the government is strong enough to cope with these monopolistic enterprises," he asserted.
"The government is in the driver's seat now. You can call it socialism if you want to."
