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## ALUMINUM DRIVE BELOW EXPECTATION

WASHINGTON, June 19 (AP)—In the midst of the government's campaign to salvage scrap rubber, war production board officials discovered today that the famous "pots-and-pans" aluminum collection drive last year turned up less than half of the metal they had expected.

The report, it was understood, showed that a total of about 11,200,000 pounds of aluminum and other scrap were collected—compared with the 20,000,000 pounds which had been predicted. Of this scrap, only 6,400,000 pounds was in the form of aluminum, contrasted with a 15,000,000 pound forecast.

Of the scrap obtained, about 5,700,000 pounds of aluminum ingot actually has been sold to the RFC Metals Reserve company, for resale to war industries and use in war production.

Informed officials said delays in shipping the collected pots and pans to concentration points had extended until January of this year—in Maine—and that final shipments of scrap material were not made to aluminum smelters until late in April.

Further, an official report declared, there was a "tendency of some smelters to delay the smelting of their aluminum scrap in the interest of their regular business."

### Gripsholm Sails With Japanese, Thais on Board

WASHINGTON, June 19 (AP)—The Swedish motorship Gripsholm sailed from New York last night with 1007 Japanese and Thai nationals from the western hemisphere to exchange in neutral territory for American officials and newspapermen who have been interned in Asia.

The Gripsholm will stop at Rio De Janeiro to take aboard 403 additional Japanese from Brazil and Paraguay and then proceed to Lae, Portuguese East Africa. Ambassador Joseph C. Grew and other officials and newspapermen of the United States, other American republics and Canada who have been interned in Japan, occupied sections of China, and other places will be taken to the east African port by the Japanese steamer Asama Maru. The Gripsholm will bring them home.

### Except for Gas, No New Rationing Till August, Claim

CLEVELAND, June 19 (AP)—Except for possible nationwide restrictions on gasoline, no further items will be placed on the general public's rationed list before August 15, the OPA's senior deputy director declared on Thursday.

The Washington official, John Hamm, also told a press conference proposed stabilization of farm prices and wages "are not dead issues," but declined to elaborate.

He said there still is a necessity for sugar rationing because of uncertainty in the shipping situation for the last six months of this year, and added:

"If shipping is available, we possibly can lift sugar rationing by the end of the year. But if submarine activity in the Atlantic continues, it is conceivable that sugar rationing will become more rigid."

### Sawmill Spokesmen Propose Lower Age Limit for Workers

SEATTLE, June 19 (AP)—Citing the steady decrease in the available supply of mill workers and the need for greater productivity to meet government orders, spokesmen for sawmill and other industrial plants have proposed lowering the age limit for male employees from 18 to 16.

The request was made yesterday at a conference arranged by the federated industries of Washington. Sheldon W. Homan, chief of the industrial division children's bureau of the US department of labor, heard the appeal.

### Government Asks Civilians to Curtail Travel

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Joseph B. Eastman, defense transportation director, made the appeal and said that if civilians restricted their use of trains and buses the government might not have to take direct control over travel.

### Two Sugar Stamp Values Changed

WASHINGTON, June 19 (AP)—The value of sugar stamps 5 and 6 has been increased to two pounds each, but each stamp will cover four weeks instead of two, so the weekly ration for each consumer will remain at a half pound.

Stamp No. 4, now valid for the purchase of a pound, will expire at midnight, June 27, the office of price administration announced. No. 5, good for two pounds, may be used at any time up to July 26, and No. 6 will then be valid until August 22.

Under the new plan grocers will have fewer stamps to handle.

## Here's How to Make Your Canning Sugar Do Its Work

(Editor's note: This is the first of weekly articles on the preservation of fruits and vegetables, released through the cooperation of the Klamath county nutrition committee and the Klamath county home demonstration agent's office.)

With sugar rationing for canning over now, the next problem is to make the sugar sweeten all of the fruit to be canned.

Fruit may be canned with much less sugar than is the usual practice. Strawberries canned with the war ration proportions of sugar are very palatable unless, of course, you have an exceedingly sweet tooth.

War Ration Sugar Syrup For Canning  
To make syrup for 10 to 12 jars of fruit, use 5 1/3 cups sugar and 1 gallon of water.

If you wish to substitute syrup for part of the sugar to make the sugar can more fruit, use 3 1/3 cups corn syrup and 3 2/3 cups sugar with 1 gallon of water less 1 cup for the same sweetness.

Substituting honey for part of the sugar, use 2 2/3 cups honey; 2 2/3 cups sugar to 1 gallon water less 2/3 cup.

The use of honey in canning gives a distinct honey flavor to the fruit. The greater proportion of honey to fruit, the greater the flavor of honey.

Fruit may be canned without sugar but the product would not be appetizing. Sugar is not necessary for keeping qualities, but it is necessary for good texture and natural color. Even by adding a large amount of sugar after opening, the flavor would not be as good as if it had been canned with a small amount of sugar.

In preparing fruits for freezing, sugar should be added in the proportions of not less than six parts of fruit to one cup of sugar. For example, six cups of

strawberries and one of sugar. This is a very light sweetening and more is preferable. War ration of sugar would be 1 cup of sugar to 1 pint of berries.
