Reports on Convention

Spokane Is Host City To June Members During June

Mrs. Florence Davis of Spokane, Washington was elected queen of the supreme temple, Daughters of the Nile, at the national convention held the fore part of June in Spokane, and one of the most important announcements revealed at this year's session was that \$11,000 worth of defense bonds have been purchased by the temple in addition to all pledges being fulfilled to the Shrine hospitals for crippled children.

Word was brought back by those attending from Zuleima temple that the Klamath Falls Nile club was especially mentioned by the supreme queen for work accomplished in behalf of the Shrine's hospitals in this district. Providing funds and equipment for these hospitals is the main objective of this organization.

Mrs. Margaret Fabrick of Medford, queen of Zuleima temple, and two of her officers, Mrs. Obera Dunn of Ashland and Mrs. J. H. Poppy of Klamath Falls, boarded the Nedra temple special car at Portland, convention bound. At Pasco, Washington, they joined Zora temple of Tacoma, arriving in Spokane that evening at the same time as the queen's special of fifteen cars. Mrs. Henrietta Sheasley of Pittsburg, Tennessee, supreme queen, headed the sixty-three temples represented from the United States and Canada. Fifty-four reigning queens were in attendance.

Convention headquarters were located at the Davenport hotel, and Spokane carried out its reputation as "The Friendly City" through many courtesies extended the visitors. An impressive display of illuminated letters three feet high, installed by the power company, welcomed the Daughters of the Nile.

Numerous entertainments interspersed the various meetings, and drills were held each evening by twelve patrols and chanters from three temples.

Most outstanding feature of the convention, according to the delegates, was the gorgeous pageant staged in the Nile temple when the patrols, wearing a variety of uniforms of yellow, green and white, presented intricate drills. Mrs. Sheasley, presiding over the pageant, wore a robe of Nile green chiffon velvet, bordered in gold and lined in white satin, and with a filligree gold collar.

Because of the election of Mrs. Grace Cost of Sacramento, California as Badoura, the Nile convention in three years will again be held on the Pacific coast. Next year's meeting, providing it is not postponed, will be at Syracuse, New York. Another interesting note is that Mrs. Davis, who will remain as supreme queen this year, is a past grand matron of the Order of Eastern Star in Washington.

A formal report of the convention will be presented by Mrs. Poppy at the first fall meeting of the Nile club. At the June meeting of the club, held at the Willard hotel, the luncheon tables were arranged in a victory design and were decorated in a patriotic motif with red, white and blue carnations. The afternoon's hostesses were Mrs. Ted Shoop, Mrs. Jerry Ricker, Mrs. V. J. Josephson and Mrs. Eugene Larsen.
