On April 20, 1912, Mr. Johnson and Lena Soderlund were married in Spokane. Their marriage climaxed a romance which began in Sweden. Five children were born during the family's residence in Bonners Ferry, all of them now living. CHOICE OF COMBAT BRANCH OFFERED

Young men 18 and 19 years of age now have an exceptional opportunity under new army regulations just issued by the war department, according to information received by Sergeant Frank J. Huhn, local army recruiting officer.

Men in this age group may now enlist at once and pick out any one of the eight, combat branches in which they want to serve. After they have passed their twentieth birthday they no longer have this opportunity. Men of this age are vitally needed now in America's fighting army because of mental keenness and enthusiasm that go into the making of good soldiers.

Applicants applying under this regulation may decide as to their future and serve in any of the following services: Air force, as pilot, navigator, bombardier, glider pilot, mechanic, photographer, radio operator and many other very desirable positions. The armored force, field artillery, coast artillery, engineers, cavalry and signal corps. An opportunity is also afforded to these men to attend officers' candidate schools and win a commission as second lieutenant.

Men who enlist prior to June 27, will not be required to register for selective service as ordered by the president of the United States. Apply at the army recruiting office, 219 Post Office building, Klamath Falls, for full particulars and literature concerning all branches of the service. Parents are also invited to accompany their sons in order that they might fully understand the advantages of army service.
