

POSTOFFICE KEEPS STEP IN WAR PROGRAM

The United States post office department, from the smallest stations to metropolitan offices, will keep step with the war program, according to Burt E. Hawkins, Klamath Falls postmaster, who returned Sunday from Portland where he was named president of the Oregon Postmaster association.

Hawkins said much of the convention was given over to hard work and lectures and little social activity was noted.

One of the most interesting phases of the convention was the announcement of the use of photographed letters. Within a short time all postoffices in the country will have on hand a special letter head and envelope combined to be used between men in the service and those on the outside. This short form, fashioned of exceptional light paper, will cut down on space and weight and give much needed space for war supplies and food for troops in foreign service.

Letters leaving this country by boat or air for points abroad will be photographed at different locations. In case the original letter is lost or destroyed, Hawkins explained, the film will be available and sent a second time to the original point of delivery.

Save Space
"The post office department feels that every available inch of space must be saved for war supplies and food for men in the service. But the men must receive their mail, too, and these short form letter heads are the answer to our war problem of transportation," Hawkins stated.

Photography of foreign mail will start as soon as stationery is printed and available to the individual correspondent.

John Hart of Washington, D. C., national president of the Postmasters association, was in attendance at the convention. Speakers included Carl Donough of Portland, who spoke on alien registration which has been done this year through the postoffice, and the nation's chief railway mail clerk who told of transportation problems of the postal department.

Hawkins served as vice president of the Oregon Postmasters association last year. He has served as Klamath Falls postmaster since his appointment in June, 1935. Mrs. Hawkins accompanied her husband north.

Shelling of Oregon Coast Expected to Up Enlistments

Shells which dropped on the Oregon coast line late Sunday night will have much to do with the response of young Klamath men in the navy recruiting program, according to Chief Gunners Mate F. R. Duncan.

Klamath's quota of 25 men, to be reached by Thursday, June 23, will probably be filled with "Avengers," although to date but 17 have enlisted with the local recruiting office.

A United States navy cruiser, No. 12102, a recruiting station on wheels, arrived in Klamath Falls Monday and will remain here until Thursday when it will be dispatched to Lakeview, according to Duncan.

DRY PUMPS STRAND EASTERN MOTORISTS

Dry gasoline pumps stranded thousands of motorists along the Atlantic seaboard yesterday as summer's first weekend brought an increase in travel and exhausting demands on filling stations.

As harried dealers hung out "no gas" signs, drivers with empty tanks were forced to leave their cars parked at the roadside or have them towed to parking lots and garages.

Philadelphia was hardest hit with all of its 3500 stations closed by mid-afternoon Sunday. Many motorists, including tourists, were stranded and some car workers were unable to get to their plants.

A. Reed Engle, president of the Associated Gasoline Dealers of Philadelphia, said the shortage was caused by doubling the value of units on ration cards to six gallons without increasing the supply to stations. "We're (the operators) taking plenty of abuse," he said.

The unit value on the cards was doubled by the government in order to take care of a two-weeks extension of the rationing period, originally scheduled to end July 1.

The new rationing period will begin July 15.

The big land cruiser, immaculate within and without, is a recruiting station on wheels. The cruiser is nine feet by 50 feet and equipped with a broadcasting system and a 16 mm motion picture projection machine.

The cruiser will bring a crew of four men and immediately upon arrival will commence to operate as an active recruiting office. Applications for enlistment in the United States navy or naval reserve will be received, Duncan stated, and the applicants examined on the spot. The men enlisted will be credited to the Klamath Falls quota as set by the navy department.

A wide variety of opportunities for men between the ages of 17 and 50 who can qualify for enlistment will be explained by the cruiser's crew. Due to the lowering of the physical requirements for enlistment in the naval reserve, many of those who have previously applied for enlistment, will now be accepted. Applicants who are accepted will be given transportation to the main recruiting station in Portland, where the oath of allegiance will be tendered by Lieutenant Commander G. F. De Grave, United States navy, officer-in-charge of navy recruiting in this area.

The cruiser is commanded by Chief Boatswain's Mate C. J. Speakman, United States navy. Others in the crew are Wilbur W. Bond, fire controlman first class, Gene L. Cherry, pharmacist mate third class, and David J. Williams, yeoman third class.

The cruiser is stationed directly in front of the county court house.

Postal Route Will Open to Serve Reception Center

Postal authorities, anticipating a deluge of parcel post purchases through the channels of Uncle Sam's mail, announced Saturday that a special star route to operate between Klamath Falls and Tulelake, serving the Japanese reception center at Newell, Calif., would be instituted shortly after July 1.

Present plans call for the operator to leave Klamath Falls at 11 a. m. daily except Sundays and holidays, returning to Klamath Falls from Tulelake daily at 4 p. m.

The articles must be returned as soon as possible, cleaned and ready for use, according to Mrs. C. E. Dennis, chapter director of volunteer services.
