

VOTERS ELECT REED, APPROVE KUHS BUDGET

Nelson Reed was named a director and the Klamath Union high school budget for 1942-43 was approved in an election Monday which drew less than 100 voters to the polls.

Reed, only candidate who filed for the vacancy, received 79 votes. There were five written votes for Percy Murray, who did not file for re-election, and E. M. Chilcote received one write-in.

On the question of approving a budget exceeding the statutory limitation of 6 per cent, the vote was: Yes 81, No 21.

On the actual proposed budget for the new year, the vote was: Yes 63, No 19.

The budget allows for limited expansion in all departments, according to Superintendent Arnold Gralapp. The outstanding improvement authorized, he said, is the establishment of an adequate chemistry laboratory. He said that Klamath, which now has the poorest chemistry laboratory facilities in the state for comparable schools, will have the best when the budgeted \$5000 is spent on this project.

Library service for freshmen and sophomores will also be expanded. At a meeting of the elementary and high school boards Monday night, the proposed salary schedule was adopted. This provides for a \$200 increase for all teachers for the coming year to meet war-time conditions.

The board members decided soon to begin a visitation program, with members of both boards visiting all schools.

AVIATION CADETS TO BE ORGANIZED

Angus W. Newton, chairman of the Elks National Defense committee, announced that a new group of aviation cadets for service with the army air forces is being organized and that an examining board would visit Klamath Falls sometime during July.

Young men between the ages of 18 and 26, inclusive, who can furnish a birth certificate and three letters of recommendation, are invited to submit their applications. No formal education is required but each applicant must take the test prescribed by the air forces, and must have a passing grade of 80.

The course of training is approximately eight months and upon their graduation, all successful candidates will be commissioned as second lieutenants in the army air forces. Pay while in training will be \$75 per month, which will increase to \$245 after graduation. In addition, a bonus of \$500 for each year of active service will be paid. Applicants passing all examinations will be placed in the air corps reserve and will remain at home until they are called for active service. Men who intend to enter or return to college this fall may enter the reserve corps and will then be allowed to complete their education.

Applicants between the ages of 18 and 35, inclusive, may also apply for training as glider pilots. No formal education is required but each applicant must pass the army general classification test with a score of 110 or they must pass the aviation cadet examination with a score of 65.

Application forms, literature and full information may be obtained at the Elks lodge or at the army recruiting office, 219 Postoffice building, Klamath Falls.

The county school office said no appointment will be made to fill Seely's place.

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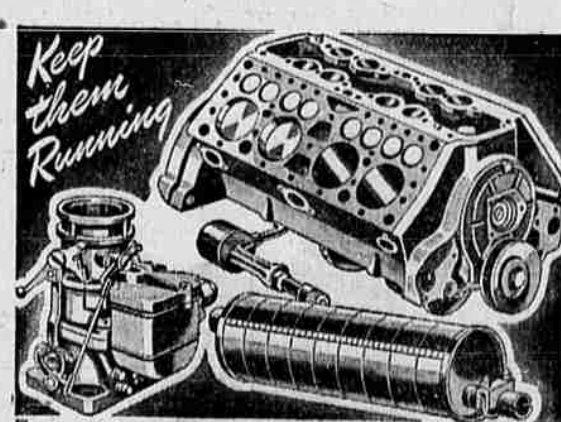
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
