

MORRIS URGES SPENDING TO CUT BLOODSHED

The better Americans underwrite the war financially, the less blood American young men will have to give to win it, it was declared by Dr. Victor P. Morris of the University of Oregon in his Tuesday night address to the annual meeting of the Klamath county chamber of commerce.

"In a way," said Dr. Morris, "it is a case of money being in competition with blood. Americans must see to it that their fighting men get the best equipment in the world. Whatever the cost, if it is a small price to pay if we save American lives by giving it to them."

The University of Oregon dean spoke to an audience of about 200 in the banquet room of the Willard hotel, his main theme being the "place of business in the war."

He described and commended the current efforts to forestall inflation in the United States.

"With everyone at work at higher wages, purchasing power is steadily mounting," he pointed out. "At the same time, there is a dwindling supply of things to be purchased. This is the inevitable recipe for inflation."

He pointed out that heavy taxes and war bond buying are intended to reduce purchasing power, and a tightening of credit is aimed at the same goal. A ceiling on prices, stabilization of the remuneration of labor, and other steps in the anti-inflation program, while rationing is a means of achieving equity in the distribution of goods.

"I haven't always agreed with the Roosevelt administration," he said. "But it is clear what it is attempting to accomplish in

this program and I believe it is sound."

The speaker placed particular emphasis on bond buying, stating that it will be necessary to get half of the personal income of the people by bonds and taxes.

America, to win the war, must have the tremendous initiative and enterprise of American business," said Dr. Morris.

All Out Effort
"If we are interested in preserving the fundamentals of individual enterprise we must put all we have into the war effort." The speaker emphasized the importance of keeping intact such institutions as service clubs and chambers of commerce which represent an important phase of American life.

Fred Southwell was toastmaster at the dinner. He called first upon G. C. Blohm, retiring president of the chamber, who reviewed last year's activities.

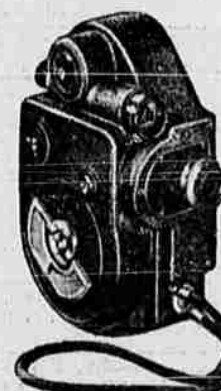
The Marshfield corps will also appear in the Veterans Foreign Wars parade Friday evening.

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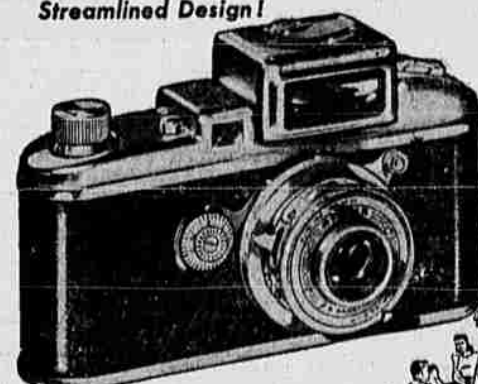
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
