

SUGAR ALLOTMENTS UPPED FOR GROUPS

Restaurants, hotels, boarding houses and other institutional users of sugar may obtain increases in their sugar allotments in proportion to an increase in the number of meals they are serving, the office of price administration announced today in an operating instruction to the state rationing administrator.

By authorizing this relief, the OPA explained it was permitting institutional users whose businesses have increased to take advantage of the same principle which already applies to any household where each new member adds his war ration book for the use of that particular household.

The regulations permit institutional users to obtain 50 per cent of the amount of sugar they used each month last year, for meal serving purposes, or 50 per cent of the sugar used during each month the establishment was in business between Jan. 1941, and April 28, 1942, if the establishment did not use sugar in each month of 1941, or the additional alternative of 50 per cent of the amount of sugar they used in the month of March.

WAGE BOOST SET FOR MILL WORKERS

LAKEVIEW. (Special)—Wage increases of seven and one-half cents retroactive to April 1, 1942, were negotiated at a recent meeting of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers' union, local 2701, AFL, according to Harold H. McKenzie of Klamath Falls, representative of the lumber and sawmill workers.

Previous to this announcement, unaffiliated local mills announced a similar wage increase, also retroactive to April 1. Local mill owners said that the majority of the lumber workers in the area plan to buy war bonds with their wage increase.

Lumber companies affected are: Peterson and Johnson Lumber company, Buzard-Burkhart Lumber company, Lakeview Logging company, and Oregon Moulding company.
