

FIFTH DRAFT REGISTRATION SPOTS LISTED

A list of registration places for the nation's fifth draft listing was announced today by selective service headquarters.

Draft officials said the registration will be conducted on Tuesday, June 30, although some local offices may register men on Saturday, June 27, and Monday, June 29.

The registration will be for "male citizens who have attained their eighteenth or nineteenth birthdays on or before June 30, 1942, or their twentieth birthdays after December 31, 1941, and on or before June 30, 1942."

Registration offices will be open from 7 a. m. to 9 p. m. on June 30. Individual registrars who elect to use the June 27 and June 29 dates will open their offices at their discretion, selective service officials said.

Don Fisher of the national park service will head the Klamath Falls registration, they said. County registration places and registrars follow.

H. White, is with the air corps detachment. Young White writes that his location, which he cannot name, reminds him of "Cold Water, Las Vegas and Pecos rolled into one." The temperature at this point is "about 140 degrees" and the boys are getting a sun tan, White writes. The soldiers wear little but shoes and trunks during the day but are required to

put on a shirt during meal hours. Private White advised his parents that "the air corps has really got the best of everything here so be sure and don't worry about me."

The Whites lost their eldest son in the first World War. Private Gladney T. White, 18, died at Fort Bliss, Tex., at the base hospital during the 1918 influenza epidemic. Their grandson, Daniel Elton Boone, 22, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. D. Boone of Ingleswood, Calif., will receive his wings from the navy air corps training station at Corpus Christi, Tex., this weekend. The young man was graduated from Stanford university last year.
