

SECOND SUGAR REGISTRATION SLATED FRIDAY

The Klamath rationing board announced today that all those who have not signed up for their canning sugar will have another opportunity to register and receive certificates on Friday, June 26. As on previous registrations, the school houses in most communities will be utilized as registration places.

In Klamath Falls two more registration places have been added: Roosevelt school and the Klamath county courthouse. In designating the courthouses as a registration place, the board pointed out that there will be no registration at the chamber of commerce.

All those desiring to register are urged to do so early in order to avoid the last minute rush. The hours are from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m. except in a few instances in the outlying communities, where different hours have been posted in the post-offices.

Volunteer Basis
All the work being done in registering is on a volunteer basis, and officials of the board stated today that they could still use additional volunteers for this work. Anyone willing to assist should call the rationing office at 5193.

Chicago Wheat

CHICAGO, June 25 (AP)—Fractional declines, amounting to as much as 1 cent at one stage, were posted in the wheat market today.

The downward drift of the market was associated with further small scale hedge sales placed against commercial trade purchases of new wheat and selling attributed to professional dealers. War news and continued congressional deadlock over the government's feed wheat selling program were disturbing factors. There were reports of better weather conditions in parts of the southwest, with harvesting resumed in some sections.

Wheat closed unchanged to 1c lower compared with yesterday, July 1.18 1/2, September 1.21 1/2; corn unchanged to 1c higher, July 86 1/2, September 89 1/2; oats 1c off; soybeans 1-1c lower; rye 1-1c down.

Oregon "Avengers" Leave For Portland to Take Oath

An appropriate send-off will be given the boys by the Veterans of Foreign Wars, in session here at the annual state encampment.

When you can cherries unpitted, prick each cherry to prevent shrinkage. Save the juice from your cherries to make syrup



Apples may be baked before canning; add sugar to taste and water if necessary. They may also be boiled whole in syrup
