JURY GETS CASE THIS AFTERNOON

Scheduled to go to the jury Thursday afternoon, wind-up arguments were heard Thursday morning in circuit court in trial of the damage case of Sybil K. Callahan versus Daniel George Moon and Updegrave Brothers, the result of an automobile accident on November 20, 1940, north of Fort Klamath.

The plaintiff is represented by Harry D. Boivin, Robert Mautz and Leon Behrman, the latter two from Portland. Defense attorneys are Day, Henson and Nelson, represented by Clarence B. Young, and Richard Maxwell of Klamath Falls.

The plaintiff is asking for \$25,000 general damages and \$2238.55 special damages. Trial of the case began Monday.

Erickson's Body Found Near Perez

The nude and partially decomposed body of a man identified as Gerhard Eugene Erickson, native of Eau Claire, Wis., was found near Perez, Calif., last week by Merl Sturgeon and Don Davidson. The two were hunting for coyote dens when they looked over a cliff and saw clothing on the ground. They investigated and found Erickson's body some 200 feet away.

Coroner Frank Kerr of Alturas said the man had been dead between three and five months. Papers in the clothing identified Erickson, who was an ex-navy man and had railroaded in the northwest.
