The Seattle Rainiers upset the league-leading Sacramento club, 13 to 5, last night as they hit a baseball playing stride similar to the pace that won them the Pacific Coast league pennant for the past three years.

A doubleheader was scheduled, but the added attraction was called "no contest" after three innings as Sacramento led, 6 to 3.

Sacramento took a five-run lead in the third inning of the first game when Hal Turpin, Rainier pitcher yielded two hits and four walks and his teammates helped the Solons with two errors.

Soriano took over from Turpin and held the Sacramento slugger to three hits and the Solons were in control until the Rainier half of the seventh when, with two outs, Seattle added five runs to one tally picked up in the fourth.

The win nosed Seattle into the upper division, a percentage point ahead of the San Francisco Seals who took an 8 to 2 wallop from Oakland.

Seal fans had an opportunity for dramatic relief as they saw Umpire Bill Widener eject Johnny Vergez, Oak manager from the game along with Merv Gudat, rightfielder, who was called out in a close play at first base.

Passeau, Walters Bid For Chucking Title

Both Hurl Standouts Last Night As Cardinals Lose Two, Risk Second Spot

Those two hardy perennials, Claude Passeau and William (Lucky Bucky) Walters, are bidding strongly for the pitching leadership of the National league again.

This year most of the attention in the senior circuit has been given to Mort Cooper of the St. Louis Cardinals, with his five shutouts, and Lefty Larry French of the Brooklyn Dodgers, with his unmarred record of six victories and an earned run average of less than one per nine innings.

But Passeau and Walters made their claims heard anew last night with standout performances.

Passeau pitched a four-hitter for the Chicago Cubs to beat the Philadelphia Phils, 3-1, and attain his 11th victory, the most games any pitcher in the major leagues has won.

Walters, like Passeau, hasn't had much help from his teammates, with Cincinnati ranking last in the Bucky Walters league in both batting and fielding, yet last night he scored his eighth success against five setbacks by holding the New York Giants to six hits over 10 innings to lead the Reds to a 4-3 decision in a twilight tussle.

The Reds' triumph coincided with a double defeat for the St. Louis Cardinals to close the gap between second and third place to a single game.

The Redbirds were beaten 6-2 and 3-1 at Boston by the Braves yesterday as Jim Tobin and Rookie Willard Donovan turned in two nice pitching jobs. Tobin was tapped for 11 hits, but kept them spaced and collected his first victory since May 13. Donovan allowed only five hits in gaining his first major league triumph.

In the American league the New York Yankees captured their second straight decision over the St. Louis Browns, 6-4, with Joe DiMaggio, Charley Keller and Tom Henrich each getting two hits.

Broadway Charley Warner came up with his second 1-0 victory in a row as the Boston Red Sox stopped the Detroit Tigers

on his three-hit hurling. Wagner's previous victory was the celebrated 1-0 defeat of Edgar Smith and the Chicago White Sox on Dom DiMaggio's inside-the-park home run.

Lefty Al Milnar, who has been struggling with little success all season, organized a five-hit 9-0 shutout of the Philadelphia Athletics for the Cleveland Indians. He had the backing of a 15-hit attack on three Philadelphia hurlers, getting a home run himself along with Les Fleming's eighth circuit clout.

John Humphries shut out the Washington Senators, 6-0, for the Chicago White Sox. Catcher Tom Turner assisted with a grand slam home run.

The Tacoma Tigers again narrowed the lead held by the Vancouver Caplans on Western International Baseball league standings last night when they defeated Salem 12-5 in a slambang game at Tacoma while the Caps were splitting a double bill with Spokane at Vancouver.

The Tigers drove Burton Swope from the mound in the first inning with a four-run spurge, then added eight more runs off Ron Smith in a continuing drive that garnered a total of 12 hits.

Don Osborne shut out the Spokane Indians, 2-0, in a pitching duel that marked the opening game of the Vancouver bill.

In the nightcap, the Indians routed three pitchers with 15 hits to win, 15-4.

SOUTH BEND, Ind., June 25 (AP)—Picking the next national intercollegiate golf champion is like playing the old blindfold game of pinning on the donkey's tail.

The field was cut from 64 to 16 players yesterday and many of the favorites fell. Earl Stewart of Louisiana State, the defending champ, was virtually the only favorite left for today's 36-hole match play, which will shave the list to four semi-finalists.

Players to watch were such outsiders as Jim Teale of Minnesota, who shot an unofficial 67 in crushing the chances of Dick Haskell, the Northwestern ex-caddy who qualified with a 142; Dale Mores, of LSU, who fired three birdies in a row to win his match; John Stoltz and Stylist Manuel de la Torre of Northwestern, and Midshipman David Paul of the US naval academy.

Each ousted favorite, with Madrid-born De la Torre, son of a Spanish pro who now is an assistant at a Chicago country club, considered one of the best dark horses along with two Yale brothers, Bill and Bob Kuntz.
