REV. BROWN BEGINS EIGHTH YEAR SUNDAY

The Rev. Cecil C. Brown will begin his eighth year as pastor of the First Baptist church, on Sunday, June 28.

Mr. Brown was called to the pastorate of the local church from the Antioch Baptist church of Portland in 1935. He is a graduate of Howard Payne college, Brownwood, Texas, and the Western Baptist Theological seminary of Portland. During his ministry with the First Baptist church of this city, all indebtedness to the property has been paid and additional property has been purchased. The church has also made a number of improvements in its educational facilities. Each succeeding year has brought a marked increase in the number of additions to the church, and in the amount of funds received for all religious purposes. The past year set a new record in all phases of church activity, Rev. Brown stated.

The church has just adopted the largest budget in its history. In spite of war conditions, the outlook is toward expansion. The church has confidence in the future of this community and is preparing to keep pace with developments. Plans are being formulated to erect a larger building as soon as conditions will permit.

As a personal word, the Rev. Mr. Brown states that his ministry has been exceedingly happy. He united with the First Baptist church before he was called to the ministry. The church licensed him to preach, and later ordained him to the gospel ministry. The congregation maintained a personal interest in his work and called him as pastor upon the resignation of the Rev. L. B. Sigle.

On June 1, 1929, the Rev. Mr. Brown and Minnie Michaelson of this city were married, the ceremony read in the local church.

First Presbyterian Church

The choir dismissal is Whelpton's "Lord, Let Us Now Depart in Peace," and the organ postlude is "Postlude" by Solly.

The evening worship is held at 8 o'clock and opens with the organ prelude, "Prelude" by Gounod. The offertory is "A Story" by Schumann, and the postlude is "Postlude" by Hesse. The pastor will begin a series on "Things We Most Surely Believe." The first will be "The Inspiration of the Bible." The different subjects are linked together. Hence none should be missed.

The Bible school meets at 9:45 a. m. and is preceded by a brief prayer service in the pastor's study at 9:40 a. m., to which all interested are invited. The Christian Endeavor societies, intermediate, senior, and young people's at 7 o'clock in the evening. All young people are most cordially welcomed.

Accepts Pastorate

Rev. Orr Leaves to Take Over Washington Pastorate

After serving as pastor of the Immanuel Baptist church for six years and eight months, the Rev. Clarence Orr will leave next week for Kent, Wash., where he has accepted the pastorate of the First Baptist church of that city. He will speak Sunday evening, June 28 at 8 o'clock for the last time as pastor of the local church. His subject will be, "The Purpose of the Incarnation." He will use as the morning message at 11 o'clock, "Be Still and Know God."

Mr. Orr came to the local church from the First Baptist church of Corning, Calif., after completing his ministry work at the Berkeley Baptist Divinity school of Berkeley. Mr. Orr is a graduate of the Bible Institute of Los Angeles, Linfield college at McMinnville, and the Baptist seminary of Berkeley. He holds the degrees of bachelor of arts from Linfield college, master of arts from the Berkeley Baptist Divinity school, and the bachelor of divinity degree also from the Berkeley Baptist Divinity school.

Rev. Orr is well known in Klamath Falls by his radio ministry, for during four years of his ministry morning services of the Immanuel Baptist church have been broadcast over the local radio station. The ministry of Mr. Orr has

been along the line of Bible teaching both within his church and throughout the community. For two years he was teacher of the interdenominational Bible class which held meetings Monday noons in the First Presbyterian church. He also held special Bible classes in the church which was attended regularly by many from several denominations and churches.

When Mr. Orr came to the local church more than six years ago, the church was deeply in debt, but at the end of two and one-half years this heavy indebtedness was liquidated. The pastor's salary has been doubled, and he leaves the church with no debt. When Mr. Orr came the church was receiving missionary aid from the state convention, but now for several years has been sending between \$250 to \$300 to the Oregon Baptist State convention for missionary purposes. It was upon his record with the local church that the First Baptist church of Kent called Mr. Orr as their pastor.

Mr. Orr, with his wife and four daughters, Beverly Jean, Golda Ruth, Mildred Venita and Helen Clarice, will leave the first of next week for their new home in Washington. The Orrs have made many warm friends while in Klamath Falls.

REVEREND COLE WILL SERVE AT SPRAGUE RIVER

SPRAGUE RIVER—Reverend and Mrs. William Cole have accepted the call to act as pastors of the Sprague River Tabernacle church. A vacancy was recently created when Reverend Grant Sickles tendered his resignation to accept a church in Redondo Beach, California.

The Coles are well known here, as they were instrumental in getting the local church organized several years ago. They left Sprague River to take up church work at Lowell, Ore., where they have served for the last year and a half. Previous to their work in Sprague River the Coles served in missionary work in Alaska and various places in the northwest. Both are musical, Mrs. Cole playing the piano and accordion while Mr. Cole plays the cornet. One of the big drawing cards of the services is the musical program put on by the Coles.

Several years ago Reverend and Mrs. Cole were sent to Sprague River to organize a church. There was no building and the couple went to work to organize a congregation and build a church. A large tent was borrowed from a Klamath Falls church and meetings were held in the vacant lot next to the Passole cabins. The church was started and the men of the town worked on their days off to furnish the labor for the building. In a few months a large well constructed church was built and a large congregation built up. A board of directors including Ted Reams, Jessie Book and Mr. Hamblin has worked faithfully during the pioneer period of the church to finance the building and all payments have been promptly made. Mr. and Mrs. Cole state that one of their big aims in returning to Sprague River is to see the final completion of the church which lacks interior decoration.

Mrs. Cole plans to organize a local missionary society in the near future. The Coles, accompanied by their three children, will move into the parsonage in the near future after completing their business in Lane county.
