

Weekend Fishing Prospects

PORTLAND, June 26 (P)—Fishing prospects for the weekend are exceptionally good for the most part, the state game commission's weekly bulletin said today.

Conditions county-by-county: Lane—Limit catches on McKenzie and Willamette. Western lakes good.

Curry—Rogue salmon trolling good. Streams fair for trout, lakes good.

Cook—Conditions fair, streams clearing. Douglas—Fly catches made on North Umpqua.

Josephine—Limit catches reported from most streams with flies. Illinois river, Deer creek, Bolan lake exceptionally good. Salmon fishing slow.

Jackson—Rogue and upper streams yielding good trout catches, few steelhead with flies. Applegate river, Fish and Squaw lakes fair.

Klamath—Good trolling in Upper Klamath lake, Link river, Odell and Crescent lakes. North and south forks Sprague river good for bait, worms and eggs.

Lake—Most streams and lakes fair.

The following is a reprint from the Bend Tourist Greeter Guide, written by D. H. Peoples, veteran Deschutes angler:

Warm weather, thank goodness. Turned warm last Sunday and the fish began to respond to a fly. Just got this much written when Ed Hamm of Klamath Falls breezed in. While Ed was a bit incoherent, I did gather that he stacked into the finest fly-fishing of his life on the upper Deschutes yesterday afternoon. He got plenty of big ones on a bucktail coachman, but the really big one, which he insists must have weighed 15 pounds, got away.

What I was about to say was that, even with the warmer weather, fly fishing is not yet consistent. One day, the fly fishing will be excellent, while the next it may be poor. This is true on the lakes as well as on the streams. Last Sunday, everyone was catching fish on Paulina lake. Monday was fairly good, but Tuesday was poor.

Justice Douglas of the United States supreme court, and party, consisting of Palmer Hoyt, Richard Newberger, Merle Chessman, Eugene Marsh, and Harry Schenk, are floating the upper Deschutes. The only information that has trickled in so far is that the justice landed a three and a half pounder.

Here's a brief detailed report on the various waters:

DESCHUTES RIVER ABOVE BEND: Fly-fishing excellent by spells. Flies used vary from No. 16 grey hackles to No. 6 bucktails in coachman, caddis and Micky Finn patterns.

DESCHUTES RIVER BELOW BEND: Erratic. Some days good on flies. Other days, only bait will get 'em.

METOLIS RIVER: Local anglers have not reported, but several California anglers have reported excellent fly-fishing and Dr. Lipscomb of Denver reported taking several rainbows that topped the two pound mark.

SUTTLE LAKE: Still taking plenty of blue-backs on bait, some on troll, also an occasional nice brown or brook.

PAULINA LAKE: Excellent fly-fishing occasionally. Deep trolling is more consistent and bait usually produces results.

EAST LAKE: Brooks and browns seem to have turned "thumbs down" on bait. Most of the catches are being taken on troll with occasional good fly-fishing along the east shore.

ELK LAKE: Trolling and bait fishing fair. Some fly fishing. All large rainbows.

Pelicans Battle to Stay in Loop Race

Locals Tangle With Leading Craters In Pair at 7:30 Saturday, 1:30 Sunday

Battling desperately to gain a substantial lead in league rankings, the Klamath Falls Pelicans and the Medford Craters, the two leading clubs of the Oregon-California baseball loop, will meet here this week in a two-game series that will stamp one or the other as the team to beat for the title.

A double win for the Klamaths would set the locals up at the top of the circuit one full game ahead of the Craters while a twin victory for the Medford nine would give that aggregation a three-game lead over Klamath Falls and Dorris as the latter is expected to take two tilts from the Grants Pass Merchants in their series at Grants Pass. A split will leave all clubs in the league in the same relative positions regardless of the outcome of the Dorris-Grants Pass contests.

A lineup slightly different from that seen by home fans will probably be on the field for the Pelicans this weekend.

Jack Allen, a husky infielder from Redding, Calif., has apparently taken over the third base job, a position filled by no less than three men already this season. Manager Ernie Bishop feels confident that he will fill the bill at the hot corner. Observers believe his hitting will put him among the leaders of the team.

Another recruit who is slated for regular duty when a sore arm heals is B. Aiken, a baseballer who performed in the outfield for the University of Oregon freshmen this spring. He cavorted in center field last week at Dorris and he may get one of the outfield garden spots against the Craters.

Infield positions for the Pelicans against Manager Dutch Lieber's crew likely will have Manager Ernie Bishop at first, Earl Hampton, the home run hitter, at second base, Allen on third and Bud Larson at shortstop.

Paul Crapo will start at one of the outfield posts, probably center field, with Hi Hatfield in left and either Alken or Mario Pisan in right. Roy Bradford, too, may see outfield duty.

Strong All-Star Nine Named by Nationals

Jurges, Hack Passed by in Favor of Walker Cooper, Rookie Will Marshall

NEW YORK, June 26 (P)—The National league announced a strong all-star squad today with seven of the Brooklyn Dodgers in the cast that will face the American league's best at the Polo Grounds, July 6.

The selections of the eight managers of the senior circuit included some surprises—such as the choice of Catcher Walker Cooper of the St. Louis Cardinals and Rookie Outfielder Willard Marshall of the New York Giants while passing up infielders Stan Hack of the Chicago Cubs and Billy Jurges of the Giants—but the strength of the squad could not be questioned.

Manager Leo Durocher of the Dodgers, who will lead this year's National league array by virtue of winning last year's pennant, will have all of his own regulars in the fold except First Baseman Dolph Camilli and Outfielder Dixie Walker.

Camilli, last year's most valuable player and leading home run slugger, has been far below par in batting this season although still among the home run leaders.

The first basemen chosen were big John Mize of the Giants and Frank McCormick of the Cincinnati Reds.

Durocher could start Whitlow Wyatt on the mound, Mickey Owen catching, Billy Herman at second, Peeewe Reese at short, Arky Vaughan on third and Joe Medwick and Pete Reiser in the outfield—all Dodgers.

Next most numerous among the selections were the Cardinals with five men, headed by the brothers Cooper—Pitcher Morton and Catcher Walker—plus infielder Jimmy Brown and Outfielders Terry Moore and Enos Slaughter.

The mound staff will be dominated by Cincinnati with Paul Derringer, Bucky Walters and Johnny Vander Meer all named, but there may be some eyebrows lifted at the selection of Derringer, with three victories and four defeats, while ignoring Rookie Ray Starr of the same team, who has won 10 while losing only three.

Completing the corps of seven pitchers are Claude Passeau, the only member of the Chicago Cubs named, and Lefty Cliff Melton of the New York Giants.

Manager Mel Ott of the Giants also was named, along with Mize and Marshall, giving New York four places on the squad.

Annual Meet At Longacres Opens June 27

SEATTLE, June 26 (P)—With women exercisers and trainers a common sight, Longacres tomorrow opens a 50-day stretch of thoroughbred racing, only major meet on the west coast this season from the Canadian to the Mexican borders.

The inaugural handicap at six furlongs tomorrow and the Tacoma handicap of one mile Sunday are high spots on the cards and the two opening days.

Despite wartime changes, the big plant 11 miles south of here in the fertile Duwamish river valley was all set to go today with 530 horses on hand from racing centers all over the west. By July 8, stalls will be needed for 225 more horses being shipped west from the Omaha meet and for 100 or more from Winnipeg.

The track stabling capacity of about 800 horses will be filled, President Joe Gottstein of the Washington Jockey club said, and then, unlike other years when circus tents were raised for accommodations, the gates will be shut to other owners.

19-Lb. Dolly Varden Taken From McKenzie River

EUGENE, June 26 (P)—The largest trout ever taken from the McKenzie river was bagged yesterday by Rube Montgomery, veteran river guide, taking a 19-pound Dolly Varden from a riffle above the Leaburg dam.

The success story of the year in baseball concerns Morton Cecil Cooper of the St. Louis Cardinals, who is most likely to be the National league's starting pitcher in the All-Star game in New York July 6.

Cooper captured his tenth victory and six shutout yesterday 4-0 with a stunning two-hit performance against the Boston Braves in an army-navy relief game that raised more than \$28,500 from 25,000 fans at Boston.

It was only the third victory in the last nine games for St. Louis and Cooper won all three with shutouts — stretching a skein of 32 consecutive scoreless innings.

The Brooklyn Dodgers bashed the Cincinnati Reds 4-0 in a twilight game by rallying for five successive hits after two were out in the third stanza. Peeewe Reese, Lew Rigs, Pete Reiser and Joe Medwick hit singles for two runs, with Medwick's blow extending his hitting streak to 27 games. Then Dolph Camilli doubled two more tallies across and routed 36-year-old Ray Starr, who had won 10 games and lost only two previously.

Big Bill Lee also pitched five-hit ball as the Chicago Cubs cuffed the Phils 7-1 to sweep their three-game series at Philadelphia. The Cubs clinched the game in the third with five runs off John Podgajny on two hits, four walks and a hit batsman.

In the American league the Chicago White Sox shut out the Washington Senators for the second straight game 2-0 in a spectacular hurling duel between Lee (Buck) Ross and Sid Hudson.

Lefty Al Smith of the Cleveland Indians achieved his fourth straight triumph with a five-hit pitching job that stopped the Philadelphia Athletics 4-1.

Detroit downed the Boston Red Sox 7-3 with a six-run rally in the eighth inning sparked by Jim Bloodworth's two-run homer.

San Diego and Sacramento, scheduled to play at Portland and Seattle, respectively, were idle because of postponements.

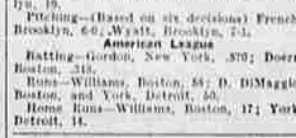
