

'BIG HAT DAY' OPENS VICTORY FETE SATURDAY

Official opening of Klamath Buckaroo Days' victory program will get underway Saturday, designated by O. D. Matthews, rodeo president, as "Big Hat Day" in Klamath Falls.

"It's big hats or a fine in kangaroo court for Klamath men found on the city streets Saturday without the customary "big hat," which is a part of the official dress during our annual celebration," Matthews stated.

"Sheriffs" on horseback will pick up the offenders Saturday evening and haul them into court presided over by Police Judge Leigh Ackerman. Activities of kangaroo court are scheduled for 7 o'clock along Main street. There will be a band and other features, those making arrangements stated Friday.

But one week remains until Klamath's big Fourth of July celebration. A record breaking crowd is expected at the two-day show which will start promptly at 1:30 o'clock in the fairgrounds arena. The rodeo committee has worked hard to present a show which will feature local talent, cowhands from the four neighboring counties of Lake, and Klamath in Oregon, Modoc and Siskiyou in California.

All funds derived from the rodeo will be turned over to the troop entertainment fund and civic minded citizens are asked to get behind the show, attend the parade, dances and the western events.

Lynn Roycroft will handle the microphone at the rodeo, there will be music, events of all kinds and plenty of entertainment down town.

Portlander Held In Shooting Case

PORTLAND, June 26 (AP) — E. D. Robinson, Portland, was held in the city jail today in the shooting of his wife, Fay, 34, maid at a West Portland home. Her condition is critical but hospital attendants said she probably would recover.

Detective James Purcell said Robinson, angry when his wife failed to return home late last night, called at her place of employment. Other occupants of the house told the officer they heard several shots, rushed to the kitchen to find Mrs. Robinson wounded and Robinson holding an empty revolver.

1. Freeze only fresh products of good quality and proper maturity. Fruits harvested the previous day should not be frozen, because of reduced vitamin content.

2. Gather fruits in the cool of the morning, handle quickly and rush to freezer locker as soon as possible. Four hours or less from garden to locker is a good rule.

3. Keep in cool place while under preparation.

4. Prepare as for cooking. Wash, and remove foreign material, decayed, badly bruised, or immature fruits.

5. Pack in glass jars with tight covers, lacquered tin cans with slip top covers, or sealer type tin cans. Best flavor and longer keeping quality are obtained in airtight containers. Avoid containers larger than one or two quart size.

6. In case of dry pack, fill containers to top and close tightly before freezing.

7. In case of liquid pack, allow one inch vacant space at top of pint containers and 1 1/2 inches vacant space at top of quart containers. Close tin cans immediately after packing. In case of glass jars, put lids in place before freezing and fasten down after freezing.

8. Rubber rings on glass jars improve pack by keeping out air.

9. When transporting fruits to and from locker in excessive heat, insulate with paper and cardboard cartons.

10. At locker plant separate

Freeze Fresh Fruits to Preserve Vitamins, Color

(Editor's Note: This is the second in a series of weekly articles on the preservation of fruits and vegetables, released through the cooperation of the Klamath county nutrition committee and the Klamath county home demonstration agent's office.)

Freezing of fruits has many advantages compared with other methods of preservation. A greater quantity of essential vitamins can be preserved; less labor and time are required for preparation; and the finished product more closely resembles fresh fruits in palatability and appearance.

Cold Soups for Hot Days Are Good and Nutritious

Cold soups for hot days make a nutritious and pleasant summer menu habit. Serve them with finely chopped mint, or parsley, or with thin slices of lemon dipped in chopped parsley. Use glass bowls or colored pottery or large attractive cups.

Clear Carrot Soup

Eight large carrots, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 tablespoon sugar, 4 teaspoon salt, 6 cups chicken broth or consommé.

Scrape carrots and grate 4 of them. Allow grated carrots to stand in a sieve for 30 or 40 minutes until juice is drained off. Then press them until all liquid is extracted. Or you can simplify this operation by using fresh carrot juice. Cut remaining carrots in slender julienne strips and simmer in butter in covered skillet until tender. Add sugar and salt. Combine carrot juice and chicken stock and boil for 5 minutes. Add cooked carrot strips and chill in refrigerator. Serve topped with whipped cream and finely chopped parsley or watercress.

Cold Cream of Watercress Soup

Two bunches watercress, 3 cups veal stock or chicken consommé, 4 tablespoons butter, 4 tablespoons flour, 1 cup heavy cream, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon pepper, green vegetable coloring.

Wash and chop watercress. Add to veal stock and cook 10 minutes. Strain through fine sieve or cloth. Melt butter, add flour and stir to smooth paste. Add stock and cook 5 minutes. Add cream, salt and pepper and tint a soft green with vegetable coloring. Chill for several hours in refrigerator and serve topped with finely chopped chives.
