

Whitebirds Attempt to Halt Crater's Nine-game Winning Streak in Weekend Pair Here

Locals Can Regain Tie With Two Wins

Virg Haynes Slated for Twilight Duty Tonight; Benham Hurls Sunday

Boasting a record of nine consecutive victories including seven straight wins over Oregon-California league opponents, the Medford Craters will match their diamond ability against Manager Ernie Bishop's Klamath Falls Pelicans in the first game of a two-game series tonight at Recreation field beginning at 7:30 p. m. Second tilt is slated for tomorrow afternoon at 1:30 p. m.

The locals, fielding their strongest lineup of the year, will endeavor to break the visitors' win skein in this evening's tussle that will mark the Pelicans' first 1942 attempt at "twilight" baseball by sending Virg Haynes, ace Klamath Falls hurler, to the mound. Haynes posted a 7-5 triumph over the Craters in the season's opener at Medford last month, allowing but four hits in the first seven innings.

Manager Dutch Lieber likely will nominate Joe Dickinson, soldier pitcher, for the twirling assignment tonight to oppose Haynes. Dickinson, a former Three-I league performer, is expected to provide Pelican batsman with plenty of trouble. He has won two games and saved another for the Medford crew since joining them 10 days ago.

Sunday's pitchers, possibly will be Steve Crippen for the Craters and Ken Benham for the Klamaths. Crippen registered a 10-1 win over the Pelicans in the initial series at Medford and has gone on since then to mark up four more league credits. He now leads the loop with five victories and no defeats. Respected Ken Benham, slim righthander from Whitman college, Walla Walla, Wash., hung up a 15-14 triumph over the Dorris Lumberjacks in his only start to date.

Receiving for the two games will probably find Glen Swanson of Medford and Virgil Gross of Klamath Falls doing double duty for their respective clubs. Reports from the valley indicate that Hal Adams is no longer with the Craters and that he may sign with the Grants Pass Merchants. Dave Dixon, other Pelican backstop, may see some action this week although it is reported that he resigned from the Klamath roster following last week's series with Dorris.

Medford's infield will have Manager Lieber at first base, Johnny Glitzen on second, Don Fawcett on third base and Norm Worthley at shortstop. Inner defense for the Bigbills will find Manager Bishop on the initial sack, Earl Hampton at second, either Jack Allen or Bob Yancey on third base and Bud Larson at shortstop.

Paul Crapo will be back in the Pelican lineup at center field with Hi Hatfield in left and either Jim Fuller or Bob Alken in right to aid in patrolling the outer gardens for the local club.

Dwight Catherwood, stocky cleanup hitter, will covet in left field for the invaders with Al Wray Lightner, the speedy flycatcher, in center and Don Madden, leading Crater hitter, in right field.

THE UPPER LAKE at Harriman lodge and Rocky point is doing its share to bring that bright spark, flushed cheeks and a tendency to stammer a job to a lot of fishermen. The usual symptoms of a lucky angler.

Anyhow, the fishing has been good and trolling wobblers is the best lure.

The upper lake at Seven-Mile and Wood rivers is also in good shape, as are the creek and river itself. On the lake trolling with wobblers and flashers and bait fishing with cluster eggs. On Seven-Mile creek the best bait is worms and small spinners.

The miracle has been performed and its potent power is still working. Last time I looked at DIAMOND LAKE fishing it was, briefly, lousy. Now it's really getting to the point where it is worth the trip. In fact, it is the best with trolling flashers next best.

ODELL LAKE — Trolling plugs seems to get the big ones.

PAULINA LAKE—The only sure fire I've heard of is late afternoon fly fishing with some flatfish trolling.

FISH LAKE — Running hot and cold. Worms as a lure are the best bait.

ROGUE RIVER below Grants Pass is still the salmon spot of the year. Almost everyone who has wet a line has caught fish.

Due to a slip of the pencil we re-opened LOST RIVER a little early. The official opening is August 1, 1942.

The small creeks in the UPPER ROGUE RIVER section are all good on flies. Also some eggs and small spinners.

American League Roster Includes Hardluck Edgar Smith, Ted Williams

CHICAGO, June 27 (AP)—Plenty of seasoned American league campaigners and a new crop of Yankees await the National leaguers July 6 at New York when they will renew their annual mid-season feud.

The All Star baseball classic. Fourteen of the squad of 22 players announced yesterday by William Harbridge, league president, were members of the 1941 winning combination, even to the leading principals—Edgar Smith of Chicago's White Sox, the winning pitcher, and Boston's Ted Williams, whose ninth inning homer brought the Junior circuit its Will Harridge sixth triumph in nine games.

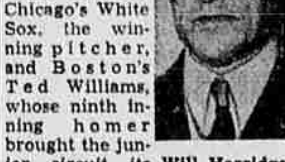

The outfielder first played for Seattle in 1929. After three seasons with the coast leaguers, he went to Detroit of the American league, thence to Toronto of the International league, and finally back to Seattle by way of Portland in 1934.

It may not be a tipoff on the world series, the outcome of the pennant races, or even the coming all-star game, but the Brooklyn Dodgers have replaced the New York Yankees as the runaway team of the major leagues.

The transition of recent days has left the Dodgers with a National league lead three games longer than the Yankees enjoy in the American loop.

The Dodgers opened their home stand June 15, with a lead of five and a half games. The Yanks today took the road at the same time, boasting a nine and a half game edge.

But things have changed. The Dodgers stretched their margin to nine and a half games, their longest of the year, yesterday by clipping the Cincinnati Reds, 5-4, in ten innings for their eighth victory in ten starts since their return to Ebbets field.

And in a night game at Chicago, the Yankees bowed to the White Sox for the first time since last Aug. 25 as hard-luck Edgar Smith, who was the last Chicago pitcher to stop the Bombers, hurled his way to a 4-2 decision, his second of the season against 11 defeats. It was the seventh loss for the Yanks in 11 games on this trip.

Al Benton of Detroit tossed a six-hitter at the Philadelphia Athletics as Pinky Higgins chipped in with two doubles to lead the Tigers to a 3-1 victory.

Dick Newsome also gave up only a half dozen blows in hurling the Red Sox to their 3-2 triumph over the Indians in a night game, and four of them went to Les Fleming.

The St. Louis Browns halted a four-game losing streak by rapping Buck Newsom and the Washington Senators, 8-5, in a night game.

Cliff Melton notched his ninth win compared with five losses by holding the Pittsburgh Pirates to a half dozen safeties in the 4-2 Giant victory.

Jimmy Foxx clouted his first home run since switching to the National league, a two-run blast with two out in the ninth inning to give the Chicago Cubs a 6-4 decision over the Boston Braves.

The St. Louis Cardinals' night contest with the tail-end Philadelphia Phils was postponed.
