**Birthday**—Mrs. Z. W. Dixon, regent of Eulalona chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, has received word from Mrs. William Horsfall, state regent of DAR, that Saturday, July 4, is the 96th birthday anniversary of Mrs. J. B. Montgomery, 2025 SE Hawthorne Blvd., Portland, loved mother of Oregon's DAR. It is Mrs. Horsfall's wish that the Oregon DAR send greetings to Mrs. Montgomery on her birthday. Mrs. Montgomery organized the first DAR in Oregon, Multnomah chapter, Portland, February, 1896, and was present in Washington, D. C. when the national society was organized in 1890. Her national membership is No. 1064, one of the lowest, and the society now has more than 150,000 members.
