## Suburban Fire Zone Meeting Scheduled

A meeting of representatives of the suburban areas, and unincorporated districts near Henley, Merrill and Malin, will be held on July 6 for the purpose of considering establishment of fire zones, it was announced Thursday.

County Judge U. E. Reeder said that a representative of the state fire marshal's office will be here for the conference, which was called as a result of a meeting of members of the court and a committee from the suburbs held on Wednesday afternoon.

At that session, the suburban committee discussed the fire zone proposition with the court. It has been agreed in the suburbs that establishment of a fire zone, which under forest laws can be done by the court, shall be undertaken now, with the possibility of later forming a fire district.

Judge Reeder said that if zones are formed, advisory committees of citizens of each zone will be chosen to assist in formulating policies and working out fire protection plans. The state fire marshal's office is required to assist in this work, and for that reason the marshal was notified of the meeting to be held July 6 at 10 a. m. in the county court-

room. He said he would send a man to the meeting.

It is possible the various zones to be set up may adjoin each other, thus forming a complete fire protection system from Klamath Falls boundaries south to Malin.

### Cairo Newsmen To Be Evacuated

CAIRO, July 2 (AP)—Non-essential workers on the staffs of French and English language newspapers here will be evacuated, starting either today or tomorrow.

Editorial staffs have received three months salary in advance. Many of their members will take part in defense work.

### Seattle Produce Tie-Up Ends

SEATTLE, July 2 (AP)—Trucks began moving fresh fruits and vegetables from produce row today to retail stores and consumers with the end of a three-day tieup caused by a labor dispute.

Settlement terms were not announced. The Teamsters' union strike still continued, however, at the Pacific Fruit and Produce

company plant, where it originated eight days ago. It spread early this week to nearly all produce concerns on the row.
