Use Vegetable Leftovers to Spare Budget

Add pennies to the weekly food budget by using parts of vegetables usually discarded.

Peel broccoli stems and cook as you would asparagus. Peel coarser parts of asparagus for soup, using water in which asparagus was cooked. Puree the stems when soft.

Cook broccoli and cauliflower leaves, the outside lettuce and cabbage leaves, kohlrabi, turnip and beet tops either separately or together for greens. Remember, green leaf vegetables are rich in essential vitamins.

To preserve vitamins in leaf vegetables cook in a very small amount of water and only long enough to make them tender. Let them come to a quick boil, then turn the heat low.

Here's a recipe using leaves which are usually discarded:
Greens Ring With Creamed Frankfurters and Potatoes
(Serves 4 to 6)

Three pounds mixed greens, salt and pepper, 3 tablespoons butter or bacon fat, 2 cups well-

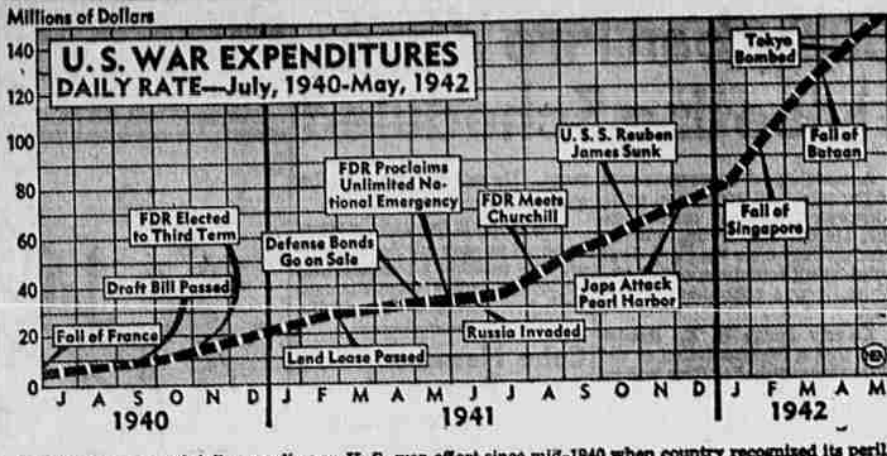

Add variety to your breakfast muffins. Chopped dates will do it—about one-half cup to your basic muffin recipe.

seasoned white sauce, 1-2 pound frankfurters sliced, 2 cups cooked diced potatoes.

Wash and trim greens; add salt and cook rapidly without added water until tender, 10 to 20 minutes. (Enough water clings to the leaves to cook them.) Chop, add seasonings and fat; pack in greased 8-inch ring mold; set mold in pan of hot water over low heat or in oven to keep hot; let stand 10 minutes. Prepare white sauce; add frankfurters and potatoes; heat well. Turn out greens onto platter; fill center with creamed frankfurters and potatoes; serve at once.

SCHULTZ, VEATCH ADDRESS KIWANIS

Freeman Schultz and Elbert Veatch, who are home from trips to the midwest and east, talked to the Kiwanis club at Thursday's luncheon meeting, describing impressions gained on their journey.

Schultz, who is manager of the Algoma Lumber company, said he found a general attitude of support of the war effort and willingness to sacrifice for victory. He said there is an air of confusion across the country and even in Washington, D. C., which he visited. The speaker said he was particularly impressed with an apparent upswelling of religion, and that people generally seem to be recognizing spiritual values more acutely than in the past few years.

Veatch described defense activities and housing construction in the Ohio country. He said he was amazed to see acres and acres of new houses around every factory town. Wages are fabulous, he said, and the people seem to be coming from somewhere to occupy the new structures and work in the war production program.

500,000 Lose Jobs or Aid By Scrapping of Agencies

WASHINGTON, July 2 (AP)—Nearly 500,000 people lost their jobs or their government aid Wednesday by the scrapping of curtailment of three depression-born federal agencies that have cost more than \$17,000,000,000.

Congress abolished the civilian conservation corps Tuesday by denying it funds for the fiscal year beginning Wednesday. The start of a new government business calendar also saw the works progress administration cut to skeleton form and heavy reductions in the national youth administration program.

In the background of the transition there was a change of eras—from men hunting jobs to jobs hunting men. The life of the CCC ended at midnight, and demobilization of some 60,000 enrollees and 15,000 civilian employees of the corps began. The WPA, its appropriation whittled by two-thirds from last year, was trimming its rolls down from 700,000 to 400,000. The NYA, with funds also cut by two-thirds, commenced dropping 60,000 persons from its out-of-school training program, to reduce the number in

Late Vacations, If Any, Slated for CIO Workers

Vacations awarded 4500 CIO Klamath district lumber workers last week by the war labor board will probably not be taken until late this summer, if at all, George Brown, chief district representative of the union, said today.

He based his statement on an appeal issued by Donald M. Nelson, chairman of the war production board, in a letter to presidents of both CIO and AFL lumber workers unions.

The Nelson letter asked that "those who work in the woods, sawmills and plywood mills forego their vacations this year, accepting instead the money payment for the vacations while working for wages during the vacation period." Lumber, the message said, has become an important and critical material for the whole war program. Cutting

may have slackened enough to permit employees' vacations. He said that CIO members were being asked to postpone their vacation plans until late summer.

Then, Brown said, if vacations were feasible they could be taken before the vacation deadline of November 1. If not, the men will receive wages in place of vacations.

Brown said that Worth Lowery, president of the CIO International Woodworkers of Amer-

ica, had recommended that Nelson's request be accepted by CIO lumber workers.

Japs Say Ship Survivors Held In Batavia

WASHINGTON, July 2 (AP)—A navy spokesman reported Wednesday that the Japanese, in a propaganda broadcast, had declared that 1000 survivors of the missing American cruiser Houston and the Australian cruiser Perth were safe in an internment camp in Batavia, Java, enemy-held territory.

The spokesman said that "while all Americans will understand that broadcasts originating from enemy sources can not be regarded as authentic, there appears to be no reason for the issuance of false information on this subject by the Japanese."

It was emphasized that the navy had no official information about men missing from the Houston.
