All that's needed if you're planning to camp and build a fire in a national forest area is a fire permit. And then only if your fire is not in a designated camping ground.

Only difference is that the chamber of commerce is no longer authorized to issue permits but you may get them at the Pelican Guard station, the Lake o' the Woods Ranger station, the Seven-Mile Guard station, or an emergency station at Cherry creek on the west side Klamath lake road.

But next weekend it's apt to be another story. More stringent rulings are planned for July 8, lasting for the duration of the fire season.

What they'll be is still conjecture. But they'll probably take the form of travel permits for everybody with some roads closed to all travel.

So you'd better get out this weekend.

British Fire Ship Off Frisian Isles

LONDON, July 3 (AP)—One medium sized enemy ship was set afire last night during British attacks on shipping off the Frisian islands, the air ministry reported today.

The Fourth of July fireworks in the major leagues are slated to be set off at twilight tonight in Fenway park at Boston where the rocketing Red Sox and the sputtering New York Yankees will collide in the most important series of the midsummer.

A mere three games separate the clubs in the standings and the game tonight and tomorrow's doubleheader will give the Red Sox a chance to move into a tie for the American league lead. Weather kept both clubs idle yesterday.

It took none of the lustre away from the Red Sox-Yankee series, however, and chiefly furnished a lull during which Manager Joe Cronin fined slugger Ted Williams \$250 and lectured him in front of the entire club for loafing.

The Cleveland Indians completed a sweep of their four-game series with the Chicago White Sox last night with a 7-5 triumph before 29,000 fans who turned out at Comiskey park for an Army-Navy relief affair that netted \$33,352.

Lefty Lovill (Chubby) Dean kept the Sox subdued on three hits for eight innings.

This lifted Cleveland within 6½ games of the lead.

Detroit, in fourth place, edged up to 8½ games by beating the St. Louis Browns, 5-4. Big Al Benton obtained his fifth successive victory, but was staggering at the finish. The Browns nailed him for 12 hits, nine of them in the last four innings.

In the only game played in the National league the St. Louis Cardinals extended their winning streak to four games by beating the Pittsburgh Pirates, 3-1, on the five-hit hurling of John Beazley, who had a shutout till the ninth.

Schwartz to Head Wool Probe Group

WASHINGTON, July 3 (AP)—Senator Schwartz (D-Wyo.) was elected chairman Thursday of a senate special committee to investigate the production, marketing and transportation of wool, succeeding the late Senator Adams (D-Colo.).

The committee will open hearings Friday, Schwartz announced, into a proposal for government purchase of the entire domestic wool clip for the duration of the war and for six months following its close.

Schwartz said the group also would investigate the practice of blending of other fibers with wool in fabrications.

Permits Needed for Forest Area Travel

Many Sections Closed Except on Pass; Registration Required in Others

PORTLAND, July 3 (AP)—U. S. foresters warned today that permits are now required for traveling in many national forest areas in Oregon and Washington.

Permit regulations, announced Monday, went into effect Wednesday and will continue until further notice, regional forest service headquarters said.

Traveling on permit demands no fireworks, small campfires only, campfire tools and no smoking.

Foresters cautioned all travelers to check with local forest service officials before starting trips to learn which areas require permits for entrance and which require registration only.

A few limited areas have been closed to all travel. These include some city watersheds and other designated critical areas, locations of which can be determined.

Earl Reynolds, secretary of the Klamath county chamber of commerce, said today that fire permits are required in all national forest areas in this region, but said that the chamber cannot issue them.

He said he had been advised by John Sargison of the U. S. forest service that all campers must obtain fire permits at guard stations nearest to the point where they plan to camp.

Reynolds said that Crater Lake national park is open to all travel. Park officials said the north entrance road, from the lodge to Diamond lake, will be open at 8 a. m. Saturday for the first time this year.

Registration is required for admittance to other areas, but foresters said checking stations have been established on highways and roads leading to the areas. Local officials also will furnish information on registration areas.

Many developed recreation areas are still open to the public without registration.

Generally speaking, permits are required to travel in all areas not open or covered by registration.

The forest service said that additional forest areas will be closed July 8 but no further restriction is contemplated over the July 4 weekend unless fire conditions suddenly become more hazardous.
