Divorces and Marriages on Increase at Reno, Report

RENO, Nev., July 6 (AP)—The first six months of this war year has brought Reno more divorces—and more marriages. Divorce filings are up 30.4 per cent and marriage license issuances have increased 25.5 per cent over the corresponding period last year.

There were 1307 divorce suits filed from January 1 to June 30, as against 1002 a year ago. Meanwhile 12,204 licenses to wed were issued, compared to 9747 in the first half of 1941.

Attorneys are slightly puzzled at the rush of divorce seekers. Many expected fewer this war year.

"Several of my clients say their husbands are going into the service and want to get their domestic differences settled," one lawyer observed.

Others believe that increased incomes have a tendency to hasten the end of long-smouldering difficulties.

CHICAGO WHEAT: CHICAGO, July 6 (AP)—Wheat prices tumbled more than two cents a bushel today back to the lows established late last month, which represented the lowest general level reached by bread grain values here since before Pearl Harbor. July contracts hit a bottom of \$1.15 1/2 before the market rallied late in the session.

Hedging sales associated with greatly expanding receipts at major terminal markets in the harvest area, including initial receipts of new wheat at Chicago, accounted for most of the selling. Short covering and buying attributed to mills rallied wheat a cent from the day's lows but closing prices were 1 1/2 cents lower than Friday, July 5, \$1.18 1/2, September \$1.18 1/2. Corn closed 1/4c lower, July 86-86 1/2c, September 88 1/2c; oats 1/8c down; rye 1/4c off; soybeans 11-11c lower. Soybeans were down more than 2 cents at one time with wheat.

HOG PRICES UP: SAN FRANCISCO, July 6 (AP)—Oregon hogs brought \$15.50 a hundred pounds today for the first time in 16 years. The price at Chicago reached \$15, also a 16-year record. The margin of only 50 cents over Chicago top prices was unusually small for this market.

Ickes Hints Gas Rationing Coming: WASHINGTON, July 6 (AP)—Interior Secretary Ickes Saturday dropped a broad hint that nationwide gasoline rationing would be necessary unless more rubber was contributed to the scrap pile.

In telegrams to the mayors of principal cities, Ickes said "results of reclaimable rubber collections to date indicate the public generally does not appreciate the urgency of the campaign."

He added that "collections so far have not been sufficient to eliminate the necessity for rubber conservation measures which we would like to avoid."

VICHY, Unoccupied France, July 6 (AP)—Three Frenchmen were condemned to life imprisonment at hard labor Saturday for the theft of 800 sheets of bread tickets from a ration card distribution center at Tours. Two others were given sentences of 30 years and two years at hard labor.

LIGHT PROFIT SELLING STEMS STOCK ADVANCE

By VICTOR EUBANK: NEW YORK, July 6 (AP)—Industrial stocks, including an assortment of blue chips, continued to operate in recovery territory today but light profit selling stemmed the advance in some cases.

Rails turned a bit mixed after a good start and forenoon gains ranging from fractions to 2 or more points were reduced here and there in the closing period. Aircrafts tilted forward at the last. Transfers approximated 375,000 shares, largest since mid-June.

Among active stocks, Santa Fe touched a new top since 1938 but failed to hold. U. S. Rubber preferred also got into new high ground for the year.

Good movers most of the day were American Telephone, Allied Chemical, Du Pont, Johns-Manville, Southern Pacific, Pennsylvania, Sears Roebuck, Montgomery Ward, U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Westinghouse, United Aircraft, Douglas Aircraft, Glenn Martin, Consolidated Edison and Du Pont.
