U. S. Military Expansion in Britain Seen

LONDON, July 7 (AP)—Further expansion of United States naval and military bases in Britain is reliably reported under way, primarily for use in 1943.

Material has been allocated for construction of three naval bases in addition to the large new repair and supply center recently disclosed to be in operation at Londonderry, Northern Ireland, for American warships on convoy duty.

United States technicians who prepared bases for the early contingents of the American expeditionary force are building additional army facilities in Northern Ireland in anticipation of a continuing flow of forces to these islands which form a potential springboard for the second European front.

U. S. NATIONAL BANK DEPOSITS HIT RECORD

The United States comptroller's call on the nation's banks for statement of condition was made as of June 30. It marked an outstanding period so far as Oregon is concerned, in that for the first time in the history of the state, one of its banks showed deposits in excess of 200 million dollars. The bank reaching this mark is the United States National, which maintains a branch in this city.

Its statement showed the high mark in its history at any time of official call, deposits standing at \$208,105,063.48 and resources at \$220,822,120.93. Deposits at the corresponding date a year ago were \$177,090,911.27, a gain of over 31 million dollars. The highest previous mark ever recorded by the United States National was the call April 4, 1942, when deposits were \$197,112,447.19, or approximately 11 million less than at this time—three months later.

According to the local management of the United States National, an ever increasing tempo of war activities is reflected in the large deposit gain. It is pointed out that this is in spite of tremendous public response in the purchase of war bonds.

OREGON CITY, July 7 (AP)—Local merchants will close up Wednesday and Thursday mornings to divert their workers into the Clackamas county berry fields to help meet the farm labor shortage crisis. Growers will furnish transportation to the fields.

SPOKANE, July 7 (AP)—A selected group of enlisted men in the second air force will begin studying the Japanese language at Washington State college Monday, Dr. E. O. Holland, college president, has announced.

The soldiers will learn colloquial Japanese and try to acquire enough knowledge of the language to be able to read Japanese newspapers. The teaching staff will include the Rev. John B. Cobb, Spokane, former missionary to Japan, and possibly one or more American-born Japanese formerly of the University of Washington faculty, Dr. Holland said.

Redwood Company Workers Strike

EUREKA, Calif., July 7 (AP)—Approximately 1000 mill workers employed by the Hammon Redwood company began their second day of idleness today as the result of a strike called by the AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers' union, local 2592.

Cliff Richter, union organizer, said the workers were called out after employers refused union demands for a closed shop in two big sawmill plants.
