CEILING PRICE ON FRUIT TO BE UPPED

WASHINGTON, July 9 (AP)—The office of price administration has announced that ceiling prices for frozen fruits and vegetables of the 1942 crop and for jams, jellies and preserves made from the new fruit would be raised shortly.

The ceiling on peanuts and peanut butter may be discarded entirely in September, said the announcement which was issued last night.

A 13 per cent boost in the retail ceiling prices of canned and dried fruits of the 1942 pack already has been announced. Price Administrator Henderson said the increases were made because of the preferred price treatment which congress authorized for farm products and because of his inability to get a subsidy program under which the government would absorb increased costs.

Air Transports Hurry Supplies to Australia

MELBOURNE, July 9 (AP)—The United States army air transport service was disclosed Wednesday to have flown 5,000,000 miles in the past 5 months to rush vital equipment and personnel to strategic points on the Australian front.

This is a service where things often must be done in a hurry. Yet only one plane has been lost, that by an accident.

In one instance, it was called on to transport a complete artillery battery—men, guns, equipment and ammunition—to a vital area hundreds of miles away. The haul involved 500,000 pounds.

Fraction of Time
It was finished in a fraction of the time that overland transport would have taken. The planes landed the battery in small balanced units with guns and ammunition ready for instant action.

When the United States and Filipino forces were hard-pressed on Bataan, the service flew a transport to the Philippines with quinine and other medical supplies.

Week by week these air freighters are carrying personnel, ammunition, plane parts and other equipment thousands of miles to points where they are urgently needed.

Serve as Ambulances
On their return trips they often serve both as flying ambulances, bringing home wounded men, and as cargo carriers hauling back airplane engines and other equipment needing repair.

One plane carried 300 tons of supplies 2000 miles in one month.

Most of the aircraft are a special type of American transport plane converted from former airliners. They are adapted to carry guns, engines and propellers lashed under the fuselage and have fittings for ambulance litters.

Many Australian planes also are being used under charter. Australian civil pilots have been contributing a great part to the service's achievements.

The head of the service is Brigadier General Rush B. Lincoln of the United States army air force and his chief aide is the veteran Australian trans-ocean flier, Group Captain Harold Gatty.

FIR, MERCURY PRICE AMENDED

WASHINGTON, July 9 (AP)—Amendments to the maximum price schedules for west coast lumber and mercury were issued by Leon Henderson, price administrator.

He provided that every grade and kind of mercury sold in 76 pound flasks came under the maximum prices already established and those prices applied prorata to mercury sold in all containers of more than 25 pounds capacity.

The maximum prices remain the same at \$101 per 76 pound flask in California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Utah, Nevada or Arizona.

The lumber maximum price regulation was amended to provide two additional specifications. An addition of \$2 per thousand board feet for dimension lumber where the buyer requires that the lumber meet the bending stress requirements is permitted. It also provides an additional \$5 per thousand board feet on Douglas fir and other lumber where the buyer specifies that the lumber meet the density requirements for dense materials.

Henderson reminded the industry that regulation No. 26 says the maximum prices became effective June 29 and all sales

and deliveries of Douglas fir, west coast hemlock and true fir lumber on or subsequent to that date are subject to its provisions.

GIRL, SOLDIER DROWN AT SEATTLE

SEATTLE, July 9 (AP)—A 19-year-old girl and a soldier were drowned at Seward park here last night when the soldier went to the aid of the girl and was himself pulled under.

Member of a party who had gone to the beach after regular life guards left, Miss Ardith Raymond, of Wiley City, Wash., called for aid while out in deep water. Private Howard Heist, 24, of Alden, N. Y., Homer Nordington and Corp. Thomas McGoldrick, went to her aid.

Nordington and McGoldrick said Miss Raymond pulled Heist under and almost dragged them down when they attempted to save the couple.

The girl's body was recovered shortly after but Private Heist's body was still being sought today.

MAY SAYS YOUTHS WON'T BE DRAFTED

WASHINGTON, July 9 (AP)—Predicting the war would end "probably in 1942 and unquestionably in 1943," Chairman May (D-Ky.) of the house military affairs committee said today there would be no need for the army to induct married men or youths in the 18 and 19 year group.

The information on which he based the prediction, the Kentuckian told reporters, was "a military secret," obtained since the recent apparent Russian reverses.

The assertion that the drafting of married men and boys under 20 would be unnecessary, May said, was based on selective service records. The war department has not requested that youths of 18 and 19 years be drafted and May said he would oppose any such request if it should be made.

Best estimates based on the recent registration of 18 and 19

year old boys, May said, showed there were approximately 3,125,000 in this group.

Eureka Lumber Workers Return To Work at Plant

EUREKA, Calif., July 9 (AP)—One thousand AFL lumbermen were back at work in the Bay-side and Samoa plants of the Hammond Redwood company today, after a three-day strike.

The men voted unanimously yesterday to return to work and

submit their issues to arbitration. The vote followed receipt of a telegram from the war labor board which informed Lumber and Sawmill Workers' union Local 2592 that the board would not consider the dispute until the strike ended.

The workers seek a union shop and a wage raise which it describes as 12 1/2 per cent, for a minimum of 85 cents an hour.
