JUNE SETS RECORD FOR DRY WEATHER

The month of June, 1942, was the driest June since 1926, precipitation for the month totaling only .07 inches. Although a dry month, the precipitation for the stream year, October 1 to July 1, was 1.33 inches above normal. The present stream year, however, has fallen behind last year, when 13.58 inches were recorded as of July 1, compared with 11.82 this year.

During the month, the weatherman recorded 22 clear days, five partly cloudy, and only three completely cloudy.

Temperatures were moderate most of the month, with the exception of the last few days when old Sol kicked it up to 95 degrees on June 30.

At the other end of the scale, the minimum temperature recorded was 33 degrees on June 11. Mean maximum was 73.2, mean minimum 43.6 and mean 58.4.

FDR ASKS ACTION ON FARM BILL

WASHINGTON, July 9 (AP)—President Roosevelt made another attempt today to persuade congress to break a long deadlock over agriculture department operations, declaring that "our war needs do not permit compromise or partisan discord."

The issue in matters in disagreement between the senate and house, he said in a statement, is that of "more abundant production of the things we need." He added that "we cannot afford to cripple any part of our productive effort with unnecessary legislative shackles."

The presidential statement accompanied his signature of a stop-gap bill which supplied funds for the agricultural department for the month of July. Congress still is wrangling over the department's full year appropriation.

The main points in disagreement are the questions of selling wheat at sub-parity prices for livestock feeding and the size of the appropriation for the farm security administration.

Sgt. Lester Finley Returns for Duty

Sgt. Lester Finley of the United States marine corps returned to Klamath Falls Saturday to take over his duties at the local marine recruiting office. Finley, well known Klamath resident, served with the marines in the last World war, enlisted for duty June 16 and since that time has been stationed in Portland receiving instruction.

Finley will be installed as president of the Klamath chapter, Footprinters International, on Wednesday evening, June 15, at a dinner meeting in the Pelican cafe.

Want to Buy a Town? You Can Have Millican, Ore.

MILlican, Ore., July 9 (AP)—Want to buy a town?

If you've got the urge to be a big frog in a little pond (only there isn't any pond, nothing but sagebrush) here's your chance.

Not only can you buy Millican but in a single transaction you can become (1) mayor, (2) police chief, (3) postmaster, (4)

fire chief, (5) water superintendent, (6) town treasurer, (7) airport manager, (8) chamber of commerce president, (9) leading businessman, (10) dog catcher.

If any of these titles appeal to you, all you have to do is lay the cash on the barrelhead. But you can't be choosy; if you

want one, you have to take the works.

You make the deal with W. A. Rahn because he's selling out Oregon's one-man-town.

Since 1920, Billy Rahn has been Millican and vice-versa. Millican itself (service station, store, postoffice, ice cream parlor and water supply) located out in the central Oregon desert isn't worth much as real estate. But Billy may soak you a bit for the fame.

You see, Billy has made Millican famous, or maybe it's the other way around. To his way of thinking it's really something to be able to do just what you want with a town without anybody beefing; in fact only in a place like Millican which has only one resident (and that's you) can you do it.

There was the time Billy up and moved the town—lock, stock and barrel—a half-mile to a location on the new central Oregon highway. There's fame, too, like the time Millican was selected for a federal emergency airport. And recently when Billy proclaimed that Millican could be blacked out faster than any town in the world—two seconds.

Billy, who was born in Chicago August 16, 1872, is too old to be Millican's postmaster (salary \$110 a month) after August 31, so he's going to sell his town.

You can have it all to yourself just the way he had it. He could not stand to stay unless he could be Millican—all of it.

Around the turn of the century Millican was a tiny village—a minor distribution point for stock ranches of the central Oregon high desert country. Road development took the business elsewhere and Millican all but disappeared until in 1920 Rahn became its total population.

The postoffice serves ranches for miles in all directions but does no delivering. If its customers live on a road they motor to Millican for their mail; if not, they go by horse. Some of them don't get their mail very often.
