Freeze Your Own Chicken For Next Winter's Meals

(Editor's Note: This is the fourth in a series of weekly articles on the preservation of foods, released through the cooperation of the Klamath county nutrition committee and the Klamath county home demonstration agent's office.)

Fried chicken for Christmas can easily be realized by those who freeze their chickens.

For the freezing of poultry, choose fat birds for quality products. Bleed well. Dry pick; or semicured 20 to 40 seconds in water at 125° to 130° F., and pick. After the birds are singed, drawn and washed, remove the oil sack, head, feet and shanks. Cool thoroughly and quickly.

They should be left whole for roasting; disjointed for frying and fricasseeing; and cut in half for broiling. Cutting saves locker space.

Pack not more than 2 chickens in one package. Wrap twice in locker storage paper and tie firmly; or pack in glass, tin or waxed locker cardboard container with tight covers. In locker cardboard containers poultry should be covered with cold water and frozen.

Use within 8 to 10 months if stored at 0° F. temperature.

Other meats are handled similarly. Beef, lamb and mutton should be chilled at 32° to 34°

F., from 7 to 10 days before freezing. Prepare and freeze pork and veal as soon as animal heat has left the carcass, which will take from 36 to 48 hours in a chill room.

Eggs should be frozen as quickly as possible after preparation. Use only clean fresh eggs without cracks. Break each one separately into a clean dish. Be sure that the eggs have a firm yolk and white, are not weak and watery. They must also be free from odor.

They may either be packed whole, or whites and yolks separately. To pack whole eggs: mix whites and yolks thoroughly without beating air into them. Add 1 teaspoon of salt or 1 tablespoon of sugar, corn syrup or honey to each pint of stirred egg, and mix thoroughly. To pack eggs with whites and yolks separated: whites need no treatment. Stir the yolks thoroughly and treat the same as whole eggs.

Containers should be airtight and of suitable size. As frozen eggs should be used immediately after thawing and should never be refrozen, freezing in half pint and other small containers is recommended. Allow 1 inch vacant space at the top of half pint container and 1 inch vacant space for pint container. Indicate on the label whether contents contain salt or sugar.

Frozen eggs may be used in practically the same way as fresh eggs. In using frozen eggs, the added salt or sweetening must be deducted from the recipe.

Further information on food preservation may be obtained from the home demonstration agent's office in the Federal building.

NEW LONG-RANGE FLYING BOAT TRIED

SEATTLE, July 10 (AP)—A new long-range experimental flying boat, built as a heavily armed overseas patrol bomber for the navy, made its first test flight over Lake Washington Thursday.

The veteran test pilot, Edmund T. Allen, and a crew of five took the plane into the air. Built by the Boeing Aircraft company, which originated and now builds the Flying Fortress bombers for the army, the ship was described as able to carry a larger bomb load than any naval plane now in use.

The plane carries the name "Sea Ranger" and has been designated by the navy as the XPB-1, Boeing said. It is in the weight class of four-engine aircraft but is a two-engine airplane, with the engines believed to be the most powerful aircraft power plants now built anywhere.

Boeing said the ship was "designed as a long range scouting and bombing plane, capable of hunting out and destroying enemy submarines and surface vessels." It is of all-metal construction and has living accommodations for a 10-man crew.

Rev. Muier Tells Graphic Tale of Zam-Zam Shelling

The whine and crash of shells which awoke him at 5:30 a. m. and subsequent experiences aboard a German raider and prison ship were described to Kiwanians Thursday by Rev. John Muier, American missionary who was on the Egyptian steamer Zam Zam when it was sunk in the south Atlantic last year.

Rev. Muier and his wife have been here the past week speaking at the Bible Baptist church. Both were on the Zam Zam when a German raider shelled it, apparently on suspicion that it carried soldiers and contraband.

The missionary told the Kiwanis club how he went into the water from the listing Zam Zam and later, completely exhausted, was taken on a raft and eventually on board the raider. The captain of the raider told the Zam Zam people they were his "guests." Later, when they were taken on a prison ship for transport to France, they were told they were prisoners of war.

"Good Papa" The captain of the prison ship, tougher than the raider chief, warned the Zam Zam people not to attempt to rush the bridge or any other "funny business." "You be good boys and girls and I'll be a good papa," he told them.

Rev. Muier told of the help given the survivors by the Red Cross in France and Spain, and paid warm tribute to that organization. He said he is convinced that God protected the missionaries through the trying experience, and he noted that while the missionaries made up two-thirds of the passengers on the Zam Zam, all injuries were among the other third.

E. M. Chilcote was chairman of the day. Harry Proudfoot was introduced as a new member of the Kiwanis club.

MOTOR TRANSPORT TAXATION TALKED

SALEM, July 10 (AP)—The legislative interim committee to study taxation of motor transportation met with Governor Sprague today and was given an extension in which to continue its work.

The committee filed a report, but there were no recommendations. The committee said that in most instances, Oregon's motor transportation taxes, affecting common carrier vehicles, are considerably higher than any other of the 11 western states except New Mexico.

"Oregon's present tax bases," the report continued, "provide a more equitable tax allocation among various types of vehicles and operations, on the basis of relative highway usage measured in ton-miles, than in the other states. This is undoubtedly because of Oregon's emphasis on use taxes, such as the fuel and ton-mile tax."
