All White Background at St. Paul's Episcopal Church Saturday Afternoon

One of the loveliest of summer brides was Patricia Jane Gallagher, daughter of Mrs. Francis Robert Olds and the late Mr. Olds, whose marriage to Lieutenant Robert Douglas Shaw, son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert S. Shaw of Walla Walla, Washington, took place at St. Paul's Episcopal church at two o'clock Saturday afternoon. The Rev. Victor E. Newman read the service.

The bride, given in marriage by her brother, Mr. Robert Gallagher of Prineville, wore her sister's wedding gown of white satin fashioned with a long snug bodice, a high neckline and three quarter sleeves. The full skirt fell in a brief train and the gown was trimmed with self ruching. An heirloom veil worn by brides in Mrs. Olds' family was of hand-made ivory lace and fell below the bodice. The bride carried an orchid on a white prayer book from which fell white satin ribbons with sprays of bouvardia.

Mrs. Robert O'Sullivan, the bride's sister, was her only attendant. She wore a sky blue jersey frock with a long full skirt, torso length bodice and square neck. Long white gloves and a small jersey turban completed her costume. Mrs. O'Sullivan's flowers were deep pink roses tied with a matching ribbon.

The groom wore the full dress of the United States army corps.
