

TRAINING FOR DISASTER SET FOR THURSDAY

As a follow-up to the disaster conference held recently in the Klamath area, Miss Ruth Cooper and John Ward, trained workers, will arrive at Red Cross headquarters Thursday to give expert assistance in organization and training for disaster work.

Telescoped into a day of short meetings Thursday will be conferences of disaster sub-committees and casework instruction for disaster relief and civilian war aid. The conferences will be held at KUHS, and the public is urged to attend.

The schedule follows:

Meetings of disaster sub-committees:

8:30-9 a. m., chapter chairman, disaster chairman, director of public welfare.

9-10 a. m., chapter chairman, disaster chairman, OCD representatives.

10-11 a. m., central purchase and supply sub-committee members, chapter finance committee, treasurer, etc.

11-12 a. m., shelter sub-committee members, representatives from hotels, schools, churches, etc.

1:30-2:30 p. m., clothing sub-committee members, representatives from stores, chapter production committee, etc.

2:30-3:30 p. m., food sub-committee members, representatives of canteen, restaurants, etc.

3:30-5:30 p. m., general meeting. Members of all sub-committees and groups who have met during the day as well as chairman of the motor corps, medical aid, and first aid committees.

7-9 p. m., general meeting.

Casework instruction for disaster relief and civilian war aid:

9:30-12 a. m., registration, information and welfare procedures in the emergency period and civilian war aid.

1:30-3:30 p. m., Red Cross disaster rehabilitation casework (natural disaster.)

BOMBER CRASH FATAL TO FIVE

WALLA WALLA, July 15 (P)—Lieutenant-Colonel Earl T. Vance, base commander of Walla Walla, reports a four-motor bomber on a training flight from the air base at Walla Walla crashed against the side of one of the Blue mountains, about five miles southeast of Walla Walla on the Hans Clodius ranch near the Mormon grade at 1:40 a. m. today.

The crash was followed by an explosion and fire and all on board were killed.

Casualties were:

Pilot, Second-Lieutenant Richard G. Hill, Mart, Texas; co-pilot, Second-Lieutenant Earl O. Stevens, Ravenna, Ohio; engineer, Pvt. Kenneth White, Vale, Oregon; radio operator, Pvt. Joseph Mallick, Corry, Penn.; Pvt. Fred-doe E. Vanover, address not determined.

A board of army air force officers has been appointed to determine the exact cause in detail.

LABOR DISLOCATION ADS TURNED DOWN

Circuit Judge Hay Assigned to Trials

SALEM, July 15 (P)—Chief Justice Percy R. Kelly today assigned Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly, Roseburg, to go to Malheur county to hear several cases. He will replace Judge Robert M. Duncan, who is in ill health.

Circuit Judge Arthur D. Hay, Lakeview, was assigned to preside at several trials in Klamath county in which Judge David R. Vandenberg has disqualified himself.

LONG BELL, UNION REACH AGREEMENT

Virtual agreement between company and union representatives on a collective bargaining contract covering the Tenant and Modoc Camp 1 woods operations of the Long-Bell Lumber company of Weed, Calif., was announced today by Harold McKenzie, chief district representative of the AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers union in the Klamath area.

McKenzie said that one contract covering local unions at each camp will be submitted for local ratification in the near future. He said that all points but two technicalities had been ironed out between the union and company.

The contract, McKenzie said, calls for an eight-hour day, vacations with pay, seniority provisions and standard district wage scales. He said, however, that following the request of Donald Nelson, war production board chief, men will take pay instead of vacations this year to keep the saws of lumber production humming.

RED CROSS CALLS FOR 200 WORKERS

The army and navy are in need of millions of surgical dressings, of which the manufacturers can supply only 10 per cent. For this reason, the Red Cross has been called on to make the remaining 90 per cent, which means that each local chapter must furnish a minimum of 20,000 dressings each month for the next 18 months.

An experienced worker can turn out 200 dressings in eight hours, it was estimated. According to these figures, the Klamath county chapter must enroll 200 workers on the project—or a minimum of 200 work hours per week.

All women interested in devoting time to this project are asked to leave their name, address and number of hours they would be willing to work on any particular day at the Red Cross headquarters in the armory.

The program is expected to get underway early in August, and volunteers are urged to report their availability at once.

AFL PERSONNEL REORGANIZED HERE

The departure of John Stanloch and addition of Don Gilman today had reorganized the organizational staff of the AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers union in the Klamath district.

Harold McKenzie, new chief representative in the area, said that Gilman, formerly president of the local at the Crater Lake Box and Lumber company at Sprague River, will be in charge of union activities in the Lake-

view area, working out of the Klamath office. Stanloch, he said, has been transferred to the Medford area until July 21 when he will assume other duties in Washington.

The shuffling leaves the Klamath organizational staff with

four members—McKenzie, Gilman, L. G. Carroll and J. G. Wolf.
