NEW TRANSPORT PLANS STARTED FOR KLAMATH

Organization of transportation plans at Klamath industrial plants essential to the war effort will be undertaken as a result of new rulings by the office of price administration. When such plans are effected, workers in these establishments may obtain recaps or grade 2 tires under certain conditions, according to Don Drury, chairman of the county rationing board.

Drury said the transportation committee of the chamber of commerce will be asked to assist in getting transportation plans going in the eligible establishments, which must employ at least 100 persons.

The plan should be handled by a committee or individual responsible for coordinating transportation of workers to the plant. Each plant should set up a labor-management transportation committee or some other appropriate certifying authority whose duty shall be to organize and administer planned transportation. This authority will select passenger vehicles to be certified by the war price and rationing board as eligible for recapped or new grade 2 tires.

The new orders set up considerations in the selection of the cars, which must be used in carrying at least four workers or to capacity. Workers to be transported must live at least two miles from the plant.

R., of Yeand, Pa., passenger in Bates' plane. Ensign Rodger B. Wilson, U. S. N. R., of west Los Angeles, Calif., pilot of the second plane. Aviation Cadet John Collins, 23, U. S. N. R., of Ocean City, N. J., passenger in Wilson's plane.

Tacoma Speeders Forfeit Purchase Of New Tires

TACOMA, July 5 (AP)—Automobile drivers convicted of speeding, negligent driving or otherwise abusing tires will not be allowed to buy replacement tires, Capt. E. A. Olson, state patrol officer in charge of the Tacoma district said today.

Capt. Olson said weekly reports on arrests will be made and turned over to tire rationing boards. He said "not even shipyard workers, who apparently are the worst offenders, will be given new tires, if they have an arrest record."

Chief of Police Tom Ross said he had not yet received a request for an arrest list but was ready to cooperate when the request was made.

SPRAGUE LAUDS MILITARY LEADERS

CORVALLIS, July 15 (AP)—Governor Sprague paid tribute to America's military leadership at a chamber of commerce dinner honoring a score of newly arrived army officers for Camp Adair last night. He pointed to Camp Adair as an example of "amazing accomplishment" and an indication of the army's ability to get things done.

He told the assembled officers that the people of Corvallis have learned to appreciate army men through long years of their association with ROTC officers at Oregon State college.

Lumber Workers Urged to Stay on Job Until Drafted

PORTLAND, July 15 (AP)—James Mahoney, Washington, D. C., an assistant in the office of the army engineer chief, urged lumber workers yesterday to stay on the job until drafted by the army.

He said lumber was of great importance to the war effort, adding that 3 1/2 billion board feet of lumber have been bought in the Pacific northwest for military construction since the autumn of 1940.
