

## PROPOSAL TO EXTEND PUBLIC TRANSPORT UP

A proposal for extending public transportation here to replace means of travel was discussed at length at Wednesday's meeting of the board of directors of the Klamath county chamber of commerce.

The matter was referred to the transportation committee of the chamber and also the retail trade bureau, with the suggestion that it is of vital importance and needs immediate attention.

It was pointed out in the meeting that bus schedules between here and Astoria, passing through several Klamath basin communities, and between here and Lakeview, passing through eastern Klamath and Lake communities, leave Klamath Falls in the morning and return in the evenings.

This, it was observed, is an inconvenient schedule for people living in these communities who wish to come to Klamath Falls to do business. It was reported that buses are now running full, and the chamber directors expressed the hope that service may be extended by adding a schedule which will bring buses into Klamath Falls in the morning and out in the evening. The fact that the Japanese relocation center is now served by the Alturas line was pointed to as indicative of a need for additional service.

It was decided by the directors to invite new members of the chamber to be chamber guests at one directors meeting.

A letter was received from Don Lane, formerly an assistant on the chamber staff, who is with the air service in Texas. It was announced that I. J. Fisher, long a resident of Tokyo, will speak at the high school here at 8 p. m. July 29, at a public meeting sponsored by the Rotary club.

## Congratulatory Messages Flood Police Chief's Desk

Although Police Chief Frank Hamm is still reluctant to consider himself as "in" as U. S. marshal for Oregon, everyone else from the incumbent to the U. S. district attorney for Oregon apparently has no doubt that the job is his. His nomination by President Roosevelt was announced Monday and awaits confirmation by the senate.

Congratulatory messages flooding Hamm's desk are signed by such names as U. S. District Attorney Carl C. Donagh, U. S. Marshal J. T. Summerville, incumbent, Chief Probation Offi-

cer Loren Cochran and Democratic National Committeeman Howard Latourette, to mention only a few.

Hamm expressed warm appreciation for the efforts of Klamath county people who, he said, had been more than generous in furthering his interests in connection with the post. He assured them that he would do everything in his power to justify their confidence in him. He also spoke gratefully of the untiring efforts of Representative Walter N. Pierce on his behalf.

## BLIMP BASE SET FOR TILLAMOOK

Construction of a new non-rigid lighter-than-air ship station at Tillamook, sixth largest in the United States, will start soon, the construction contract having already been awarded, according to word received at the local navy recruiting station.

Other blimp bases in operation or under construction on the Pacific coast are at Santa Ana and Sunnyvale, Calif. In addition, several smaller auxiliary stations have been built to provide refueling and mooring stations for the craft.

Sites for new ammunition depots at Hastings, Neb., and McAlester, Okla., have been approved by Navy Secretary Knox, each to cost about \$45,000,000 and cover approximately 30,000 acres, it was reported here.

## Bible Backs Up Young Bridegroom

BLUEFIELD, W. Va., July 16 (AP)—A Mercer county man who recently became a bridegroom, asking the draft board at Princeton for deferment from selective service, quoted Deuteronomy 24:5 on his questionnaire:

"When a man hath taken a new wife, he shall not go out to war, neither shall he be charged with any business; but he shall be free at home one year, and shall cheer up his wife which he hath taken."

The bridegroom was classified 1-A.

## OPA Workers Warned Against Political Activity

WASHINGTON, July 16 (AP)—Price Administrator Leon Henderson said Wednesday OPA employees who engage in political activity would be dismissed.

"No one in the OPA organization is going to be permitted to play politics with the war effort," Henderson asserted, in an administrative order reminding his staff of its obligations under the Hatch act which prohibits government workers from taking active part in political management or political campaigns. Failure to comply strictly with the terms of the law will mean instant dismissal, he said.

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## BETTER ANTI-SUB METHODS SEEN

LONDON, July 16 (AP)—Improved American anti-submarine methods plus "definitely good results" from RAF bombardment of nazi submarine bases and factories is expected to cut shipping losses in American waters, an RAF commentator declared Wednesday.

United States army air force officers are participating in conferences on the targets for the RAF offensive which in time will be swelled by American bombers.

William C. Bullitt, special assistant to Secretary Frank Knox of the U. S. navy, arrived here Wednesday and it was understood that he would confer with admiralty shipping officials on the best means of combating submarines.

The RAF not only is hammering at submarines in all stages of production but is continuing "large-scale attacks on German war industry" as ordered by the cabinet, the RAF source asserted.

## FOREST PERMIT HOURS CUT DOWN

Registrations can be made and permits obtained for travel in the restricted areas of the Rogue River national forest between the hours of 7 a. m. and 8 p. m., according to F. G. Whitney, acting supervisor.

Whitney said that manpower on the forest is limited this year, and for that reason the permit and registration service can only be offered during the hours mentioned.

In the past, he said, the forest service had granted campfire permits at all hours of the day and night, but conditions this year make that impossible.

## Tests Show K. F. Domestic Water Pure, Safe

California Oregon Power company reported Thursday that latest tests of water in the Klamath Falls domestic system show "high purity and safety."

Professor Wilfred F. Langelier, engineering chemist, University of California, made the analysis, the samples being taken from the pump house, Willard hotel, Southern Pacific depot and Shasta reservoir.

"The highest state and federal standards of safety are fully complied with," said Professor Langelier in reporting the result of his analysis.

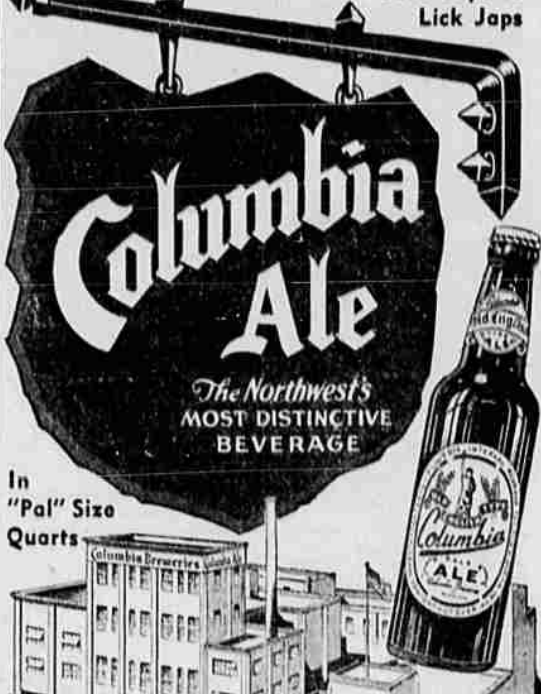
Young Lybrand had saved the money during two years of employment, his parents said.

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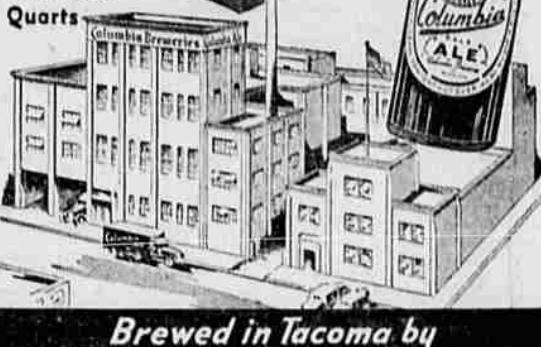

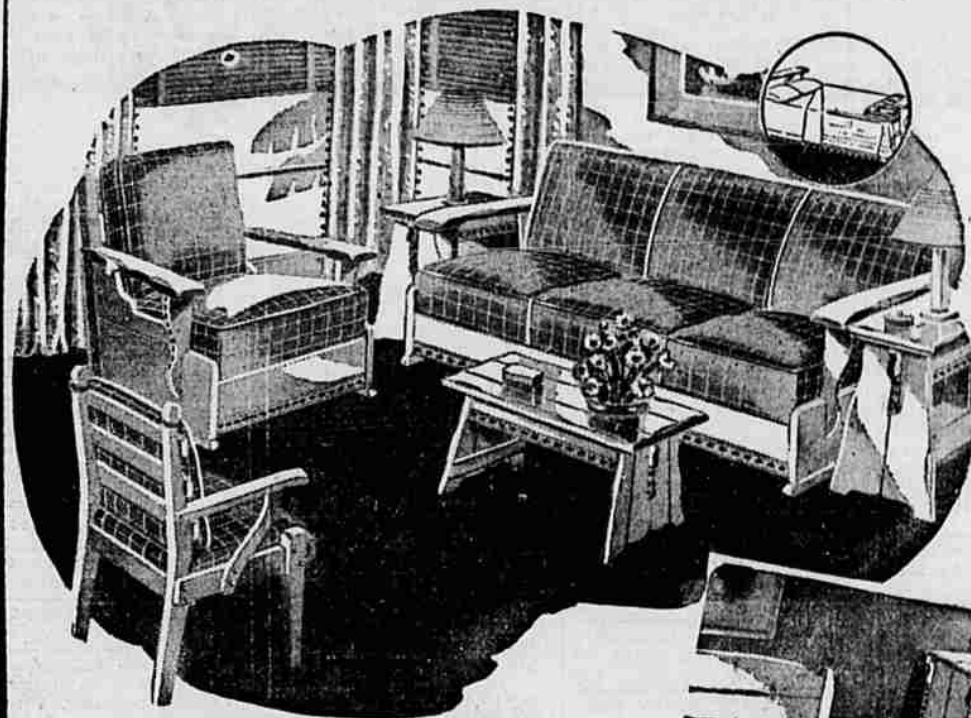
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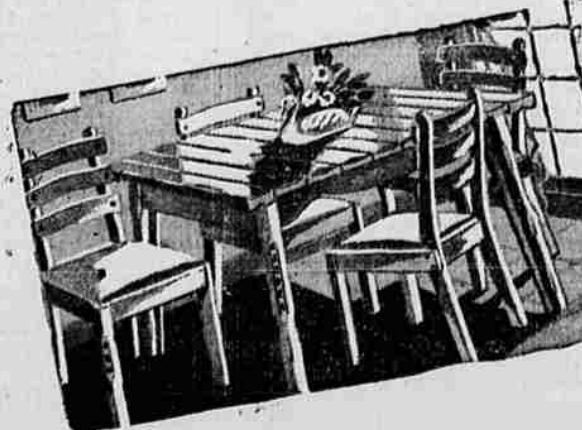
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
