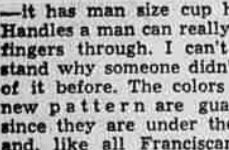

# TO INFLATE OR NOT? STUMPS DAY'S MARKET

NEW YORK, July 16 (AP)—To inflate or not inflate? That was the question which stumped the stock market today and kept most dealers in a narrowly irregular area.  
The ticker halted at frequent intervals and transfers for the full proceedings approximated 275,000 shares.  
The market's inflationary temperature, which has received the principal credit for the June-July upswing, cooled somewhat when it was reported the administration was considering a move for wage-price legislation.  
Steels retained their equilibrium in the face of word "Little Steel" workers had been granted a 44-cent daily pay boost. Occasional plus marks were pinned on U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Republic and Youngstown Sheet.

## WOMAN, 68, HELD ON MURDER CHARGE

SAN FRANCISCO, July 16 (AP)—A 68-year-old woman was held on a murder charge today in the fatal shooting of Lucien Doyen, 38, as the climax to a long-standing argument over noise the Doyen children made in the downstairs flat.  
Police Inspectors Frank Ahearn and Al Corras said the woman, Mrs. Mary Slater, had confessed the shooting but insisted that Doyen had goaded her by constant insults.  
They said Doyen, an employee of the Southern Pacific hospital and the father of three girls, died shortly after a bullet from the woman's .25 caliber pistol pierced his chest.  
Officers said Mrs. Slater complained about the noise the Doyen children were making, and turned on her radio loudly and stomped on the floor when they failed to stop. Doyen then went upstairs to protest and was shot as his wife below called out, "Look out, she's got a gun!"

## BOSTON WOOL

BOSTON, July 16 (AP-USA)—Some sales of bright one-quarter blood wools were reported today in the Boston market at a greased price of 50-51 cents, delivered. Fine Delaine staple sold at 48 cents in the grease for wools shrinking about 60 per cent. Some one-half blood territory wool sold very close to ceiling. There was a demand for scoured fleece wools, grades 50's to 56's, at a price range of \$1.00-05.
