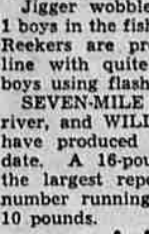




Fishin's Fun

# Duck Hunting Season Lenthened Ten Days

### Ickes Reveals 70-Day Shooting, Extends Day to Sunset; Geese Protected

WASHINGTON, July 17 (AP)—Federal migratory bird hunting regulations for 1942 were announced Thursday by Interior Secretary Ickes, providing a 70-day shooting season for ducks instead of the 60 days permitted in 1941.

Duck hunting will begin in the northern zone on September 26, intermediate zone October 15 and southern zone, November 2.

While liberalizing the restrictions on hunting ducks, which showed a vast increase in numbers last year, Ickes tightened rules for the protection of geese, doves and other birds that have not increased in population.

Duck hunting hours will run from sunrise to sunset, instead of from sunrise to 4 p. m. as formerly, and legally killed birds may be possessed for 30 days after the close of the season, instead of 20 days.

Regulations governing bag and possession limits of ducks remain unchanged except that a new provision makes the possession limit on the first day of hunting conform to the daily bag limit.

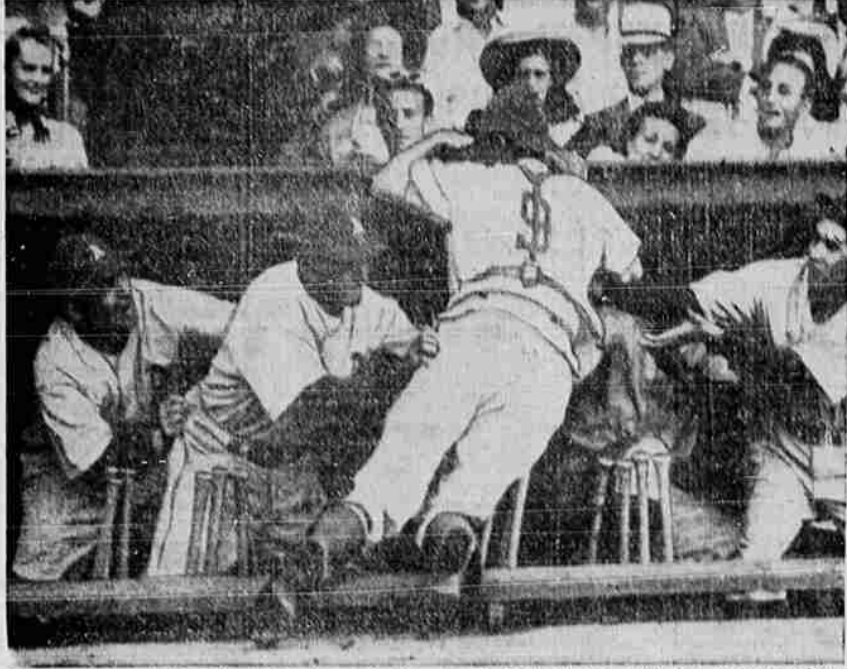
