

Tour Made of Klamath Gardens

Womens Library Club Garden Group View Attractive Spots

Ten of Klamath Falls' most outstanding gardens were visited on Wednesday, July the fifteenth by fifty members and friends of the Garden club group of the Womens Library club when they enjoyed their annual garden tour.

Gathering at the C. W. Hornbrook home on Pacific Terrace, at nine o'clock, they proceeded to the T. B. Watters garden which they entered through an archway aflame with Paul Scarlet Climber roses to view the terraced, moss-green rock garden near the patio and the border of flowers around the lawn, so arranged that there are blooms from early spring to late fall.

The gold fish pond, and Virginia Creeper twining over the house were what took the eye at the Hugh Campbell's where the flowering shrubs and trees bordering the lawn above several terraces added a colorful note.

Mrs. Fred Schallack's fine collection of tuberous begonias and yellow calla lilies were set off to perfection in her garden where large locust and blue spruce shaded the lawn bordered by many flower beds and shrubs.

Members of the group were quite taken with a banty hen and her little chicks which were useful as well as ornamental in Mrs. R. E. Oakes, garden. They help keep pesky earwigs under control, a major problem in any gardener's life. Mrs. Oakes, whose lawn and flowers are quite new, takes pride in doing most of the work herself.

Distinctive features of Mrs. A. O. Roenicke's gardening endeavors is the greenhouse where she and Dr. Roenicke grow plants for transplanting to the garden and window boxes and also a wide variety of cactus. The visitors were interested by the use of hot water heat to keep the greenhouse at the proper temperature.

Unique in its setting was the garden of the E. B. Redmans, perched high on a natural promontory back of their house on Front street with a sweeping view of Upper Klamath lake. Crevices in a large outcropping of rock had been planted with flowers, while a lily pond, a shaded lawn and an old juniper rooted in the rocks formed a picturesque spot to rest.

Mrs. Rosa McCormack's garden on Lakeshore drive delighted the "tourists" with the way in which everything has been kept as natural as possible, taking advantage of the old apple orchard and using huge lilac bushes to outline lanes. Especially intriguing was the old iron kettle with vines growing in it, used as a weight on the gate.

"High" point of the trip was reached at E. F. Graham's on Bismark street in Shippington—the "height" being in the extremely tall Pacific strain of delphiniums, which he raises as a hobby. The mammoth varieties were in full bloom and a sight to behold. Mr. Graham is also hybridizing iris and getting a start in many varieties of peonies.

After a visit to the Haydens' on Washington street, where a large outdoor fireplace and a lily pond surrounded with wild ferns and Indian mortars were centers of interest, the group gathered for luncheon at "Anabaglish," the Andrew Collier place at Pine Grove. There they spread out their lunches and relaxed as they enjoyed the panorama provided by many pines, the rolling hills and green fields surrounding the restful garden.
