Highlights of Meeting Told

Mrs. Sabo Reports on Soroptimists Biennial Held in Cleveland in June

Seventeen members of the Soroptimist club gathered for a special meeting Thursday noon in the Pelican party room to hear President Coral Sabo give highlights from the federation's biennial convention held in Cleveland in June.

Mrs. Sabo told first of stopping over in Missoula, Montana for the installation of a new Soroptimist club, and of participating in the ceremony by having the privilege of installing one of the new officers. From there a group of the Soroptimists from the northwest region journeyed to Chicago where they were joined by Mrs. F. W. Bertram of Klamath Falls.

The Venturists held their convention preceding the Soroptimists and were on hand to greet the incoming members at Cleveland and to hold a reception for them on Sunday evening. There were 280 in attendance at the convention, of which about 250 were delegates, according to Mrs. Sabo.

The Monday morning session formally opened with memorial services and reports of committees, important among which was that of the evacuee committee. Half of the funds sent in by the clubs to this committee were refunded due to suspension of the work, and the balance was invested in defense bonds. It was recommended, Mrs. Sabo said, that members whose classifications were affected by defense work or the changed order should still retain their classifications during the war period.

Another report disclosed that a thousand new members had been taken into the federation during the past two years. The southwest region, with 1350 members, is the largest district, and the northwest region with 650 members is third.

The extension committee reported that a new club had been organized at Lakeview, Oregon, which the Klamath Falls club had secured after the call to convention.

The Monday afternoon session was given over to informal discussions, with Mrs. Bertram attending the extension round table and Mrs. Sabo the classification. A new classification key was adopted after much discussion, especially regarding the Healing Arts and Sciences and Insurance, in which a greater change was made than elsewhere.
