

CADET BOARD ACCEPTS MEN FOR SERVICE

The army air force aviation cadet examining board Tuesday announced the results of the last examination held in the Klamath Falls army July 8.

A number of others have already received their commissions and are now flying combat planes over the war zones.

Elks' Cooperation
All of the applicants listed above were secured through the cooperation of the Elks national defense committee of which Angus W. Newton is chairman. The Elks lodge throughout the nation is sponsoring these young flyers and will continue to do so during their entire military career, it was stated.

Newton announced that a new group is now being formed in Klamath Falls and all young men are invited to investigate the possibility of enrolling for this type of training. Applicants must be between the ages of 18 and 26, inclusive, must be in good physical condition, must be able to furnish a birth certificate or other documentary evidence of date of birth and birth place, three letters of recommendation and be able to pass the mental examination prescribed by the army air forces. Successful applicants will be enlisted in the air force enlisted reserve and will have three choices as to the method of entering the service:

Three Choices
1. Applicant may enlist in the army air forces (unassigned) and enter active service immediately as a private. It is understood that he will be appointed an aviation cadet and start cadet training as soon as training facilities become available.

2. He may enlist in the air force enlisted reserve and ask for non-deferred duty. In that case he may remain at home, at school or employed until he is called to active duty and appointed an aviation cadet, which will be as soon as facilities become available, which may be several months.

3. He can, if he is an undergraduate student in good standing in an accredited college, enlist in the air force enlisted reserve and ask for deferred status. In that case if he maintains satisfactory scholastic standing, he will not be called until graduation or withdrawal from college, except in the event of necessity by direction of the secretary of war.

Ella May Smith to Get Police Reserve Award

One of the highlights of the police and sheriff's reserve picnic, July 26 at Moore park, will be the presentation of the merit award of the Klamath Falls police reserve to Ella May Smith, 14-year-old first aider who revived her baby brother after he was rescued from the Williamson river last spring. She will be the first person ever to receive the award.

"Brother," the two-and-one-half-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer K. Smith, was brought to shore by his mother, who discovered the child floating face up in the river. While Mrs.

Smith ran for help, Ella May immediately put her first aid instruction to use and resuscitated the young victim. Her work was warmly praised at the time.

"Brother" will be on hand with his sister at the picnic to see Ella May get her small silver star from the police reserve in recognition of her outstanding service. Captain Ira Sherman of the police reserve will make the presentation.

The merit award of the Klamath Falls police reserve is given to any young person in the community who performs an outstanding service.

Sign Language Argument Ends In Stabbing
CHICAGO, July 22 (P)—A tavern argument carried on in sign language was climaxed by the stabbing of one of the two deaf disputants early today.

Joe Guepfer, 45, who was knifed in the abdomen, ran into a police station adjoining the tavern and wrote the name of his assailant on a pad on the desk of Sergeant Rudolph Ziegler. The man he named was promptly seized and Guepfer was removed to a hospital where his condition was described as serious.

Ziegler said a woman witness to the fight, also deaf, told him—in writing—Guepfer broke a cane over the other man's head when he called Guepfer an obscene name in sign language. The stabbing followed, she reported.

Improper Course Held Cause of TWA Plane Crash
WASHINGTON, July 22 (P)—The civil aeronautics board reported Tuesday that the crash of a TWA plane near Las Vegas, Nev., last January 16, in which actress Carole Lombard, 18 other passengers and the three crew members were killed, probably resulted from failure of the pilot to follow the proper course.

The big air liner crashed into Potosi mountain, which the CAB said was on an "improper" flight course between Las Vegas and Burbank, Calif.

Captain Wayne C. Williams and First Officer M. A. Gillette would have realized they were off the course if they had been using their radio equipment, the report said, adding that "it seems obvious that the pilots were not using the radio range for navigational purposes."

NEW RUBBER RULES CUT CIVILIAN USE

WASHINGTON, July 22 (P)—New rubber specifications for a long list of civilian products were established by the war production board today, an action designed to save up to 500 tons of crude rubber a month.

Effective immediately, civilian rubber footwear can be manufactured in but one color, black, and production must be restricted to seventeen ordinary styles, ranging from children's rubbers to dress overshoes, and ten types of boots and work shoes required under severe weather conditions.

Other products for which strict specifications were set up include belting, hose, milk and milking machine equipment, printing rubber products, rubber-lined tanks, drums, and rubber protection for industrial equipment, and mine and industry safety parts.

Officials said the orders affecting rubber footwear alone would save about 100 tons of rubber monthly.

Heir, Gas Station Cinderella Off On Honeymoon

PHILADELPHIA, July 22 (P)—Walter C. Pew, Jr., and his gas station Cinderella were honeymooning Tuesday in a new Philadelphia story that started when Dan Cupid traded his bow and arrow for a grease gun.

Pew, an heir to the Sun Oil company fortune, and Miss Sophie Boychuck, pretty, blonde attendant at a Sun filling station, were married last night.

And although Philadelphia's main line has always seemed a long way from Parrish street, this romance has the blessing of both families.

The young couple—both gave their ages as 23 in taking out a license—met several months ago when the Sun company began hiring girl attendants to replace men called into service.

Young Pew, son of the general manager and great-grandson of the founder of Sun Oil, has been working around the stations to learn the business. Friends say he's only 19.
