COURT ACCEPTS RESIGNATION OF FRANK HOWARD

The Klamath county court on Wednesday accepted the resignation of Frank Zaring Howard as county engineer.

Howard a few days ago gave the court a letter in which he said he was resigning unless provided with an assistant. He said the court could consider the letter a resignation if it wished to do so.

The resignation became effective Wednesday, upon its acceptance by the court.

County Judge U. E. Reeder stated that for the time being, the court would follow a policy of hiring an engineer on a per diem basis when it needed engineering services.

Howard was engineer by appointment by the court, but by election he is the county surveyor. He will continue in that office and will appear on the ballot in the November election as the only candidate for surveyor.

Courthouse observers considered the possibility that Howard and the court might get together later on and that the surveyor would resume his work as engineer.

The trouble arose, apparently, when an item for engineering assistance, proposed for the 1942-43 budget by Howard, was rejected by the budget committee.

Hull to Broadcast Thursday Evening

WASHINGTON, July 22 (AP)—Secretary of State Hull will tell the nation of the seriousness of the war in a radio speech Thursday between 6:30 and 7:15 p. m., PWT over all networks.

President Roosevelt, announcing the broadcast yesterday, said he considered the speech an able and conclusive summary. It will describe, he added, how serious the situation is to United States citizens and the rest of the world.

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Churchill's Son Predicts War End In '43 or '44

NEW YORK, July 22 (AP)—Randolph Churchill, 31-year-old son of the British prime minister, predicted today that "if we're lucky" the United Nations would win the war by the end of next year, "and if we're unlucky then we'll win by the end of 1944."

"We, the British, were only one-quarter ready for this war," Churchill said at a press conference. "Germany prepared for 20 years for this war. The English have not been as clever in this war as the enemy."

"We have been largely enthusiastic amateurs in this war as compared to professional military men. We still have a lot to learn, but we are learning

fast and we are going to win." Churchill, captain of a British parachutist formation, reached here yesterday from Egypt where he suffered a crushed vertebra in an automobile accident last May.
