

STATE RETAIL SALES RISE 8 PER CENT

June 1942 sales of independent retailers in Oregon, based upon reports from firms in most kinds of business, were 8 per cent higher than in June 1941, and 1 per cent above May 1942, according to a preliminary announcement released today by J. C. Capt, director, bureau of the census. Sales for the first six months of 1942 were 8 per cent higher than for the corresponding period of last year. Of the several kinds of business covered by this current survey, food stores showed a gain of 26 per cent, June 1942 compared with June 1941; apparel stores a gain of 20 per cent; motor vehicle dealers a loss of 83 per cent; furniture stores a loss of 9 per cent, and the lumber-building-hardware group a gain of 10 per cent. Department store sales rose 13 per cent.

K. F. Loses
Stores in Portland reported an average gain of 7 per cent from June 1941; Salem stores a gain of less than one-half of one per cent; Astoria a loss of 14 per cent; Eugene a loss of 13 per cent, and Klamath Falls a loss of 7 per cent. Stores located in areas of less than 2500 population reported an average gain of 7 per cent.

Expert to Study Coos Bay Coal

George Watkin Evans of Seattle, one of the foremost coal mining engineers on the Pacific coast, has been appointed principal consulting mining engineer for the coal division of the U. S. Bureau of Mines, and assigned to the investigation of the Coos Bay coal field.

Outlining the program of study, Evans stated that he expected to determine the best source from which coal can be produced in the largest quantity at the lowest cost and in the shortest period of time. This is necessary, he said, to insure a supply of fuel for western Oregon army camps, and to increase the supply of coal for the region generally.

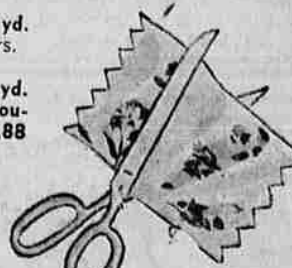
